PRESENTS MEDALS.

Pres. Pritchett Attends Senior Night at Kommers and Gives Cabot Medals.

Senior Night at the Kommers drew out one of the largest crowds that have attended the Saturday evening dinners at the Union. Pres. Pritchett was present and gave a talk on the Cabot Medals. He was forced to depart early, so Dean Merrill took his place in presenting the Medals to the men who have already won them. The other speakers were Major Briggs, John Mahan, and W. C. Towne. M. A. Coe, '06, was toastmaster.

An excellent program, arranged by George Henderson, '06, chairman of the committee in charge, was then rendered by Seniors, as follows: Sleight of Hand, Mann; Musical Specialties; C. F. The chef of the Union, Mr. Maciver, had personally decorated the Union with potted plants, and had put tablecloths on the tables. He was given a hearty Tech cheer.

HAVE SUCCESSFUL MEET.

The Gymnastic Team Draws Large Crowd to Second Annual Meet.

The second annual exhibition of the Technology Gymnastic Team was held last Friday night in the Gym, under the direction of Mr. W. C. Towne. There were two teams, which took turns in competing in the twelve events. The best all-round work was done by Capt. Griffin, '06, Lourie, '06, and Smith, '06, all of whom excelled in their work on the flying rings, horizontal bar, and parallel bars. The first event was an exhibition on the long horse by Griffin, '06, Byron, '08, Haywood, '06, and Brown, '08. The second team then did some work on the horizontal ladder, and the first and second teams combined did some difficult stunts on the high horizontal bar, some of which were very original. This was followed by far the prettiest event of the evening, an exhibition of club swinging by Smith, '06; he showed great skill, the result of much practice. Two or three new exercises which he exhibited for the first time were especially clever.

Teams 1 and 2 alternated on the next three events, the buck, flying rings, and high dive. Lourie and Smith did the most difficult tricks on the flying rings, and Pearse, '09, showed up well. Tylee, '07, reached the best mark in the high dive, getting over 6 feet, and Byron did about 5 feet 10 inches. The next event was a very exciting handball match between Tylee, '07, and Lichtenstein, '06; the game was close and hotly contested, but was finally won by Tylee, owing to his greater reach.

After some work on the parallel bars, which included some stunts by Smith, there was a three-round boxing match between Donovan, '06, and Schneider, '08. Donovan seemed to be rather better at the game than his opponent, and there was much applause at the end of the last round. Team 1 gave exhibitions in tumbling and pyramids; and then the last event of the evening was a hand balance walk by six men, which caused a great deal of amusement.
