Owing to the recess in all departments of the Institute on April 19, the next regular issue of **THE TECH** will appear Saturday instead of Friday morning.

Since last Thursday evening the Tech Show management have labored hard in the endeavor to assign seats to all who applied **The Tech** for them. We are informed, however, that a number of underclass men could not obtain the seats that they wanted and so they did not receive any, owing to the large number in the classes ahead of them. To these students we would suggest the buying up of the best seats in the second balcony and the attending in a body for the purpose of showing their enthusiasm for the Show and the players. These seats may be secured at any time on application to the management.

The ever increasing popularity of the Show is manifested by the fact that, for both the Thursday and Friday performances, every seat in the house with the exception of those in the second balcony has been assigned. We believe that it would be a very desirable thing to decorate the theatre with banners and flags appropriate to Technology for the reason that it would show to the public and to the friends of the Institute that we carry our enthusiasm for Technology with us wherever we go. The Show is given for the benefit of the students at the Institute in that the receipts are used for athletics; the management and members of the Show have given generously of their time to make the actual performance a success. To the undergraduates and underclass men especially is accorded the privilege of showing their enthusiasm for the Show and of co-operating with

the management to decorate the theatre. To carry out this plan it is suggested that the classes, the various professional societies and the state clubs provide suitable banners and lend them to the management to use for decorative purposes. Their use is not limited to this year or this occasion, and we believe that the good resulting from this display will far outweigh the small expenditure that it may be necessary to make for it.

Owing to the success of the publication of the *Architectural Annual* last year, the Architectural Society, at its last meeting, decided to make use of some of its available funds. The sum of \$100 will probably be invested in photographic plates, either of books out of print or of original drawings in the department. The Society is also planning to deposit \$200 as a nucleus for a fund to start a scholarship in the Architectural Department.

The Instructors' Club held its regular monthly dinner last night at the Union, Pres. Sawyer presiding. The company was very much amused by the speeches made by Dr. Tyler and Mr. Rand, after which Mr. Blackstein told some of his funny stories. The business of the year had all been transacted at former meetings so that the dinner was on purely social lines. The regular meeting next month will be a smoker.
