The report of the Class Day Committee which we publish on another page of this issue shows that the Committee has done its work thoughtfully and carefully. Castle Square Theatre.

Bertha Kalich, who will appear at the Tremont for a fortnight's engagement beginning this week, will be seen for the first half of her stay in Maeterlinck's powerful and poetic play, "Monna Vanna." The introduction of Madame Kalich to the English speaking stage has added to its stars a player of apparently limitless emotional force, much temperament and finished technique. Her portrayal of the heroine of Maeterlinck's big and impressive drama has been a revelation to those unfamiliar with her work in other tongues.

Dean Judson of Chicago University has announced that absolute free speech will be permitted to students and faculty members alike. On the strength of this, a student delivered an oration which was an eulogy of Robert Ingersoll and a positive endorsement of his religious views.
