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LAST KOMMERS.

Mr. John Z. White of Chicago to Speak on The Single Tax.

Mr. John Z. White, a lecturer of wide reputation, will be the speaker at Kommers to-morrow, the last of the year. His subject will be "The Single Tax," a topic of absorbing interest and vital importance. Mr. White is one of the leaders of the Single Tax movement, which has for its object the replacing of the many forms of real estate, personal property, and pole taxes by a graduated single tax. This agitation was commenced twenty years ago by Henry George, and in recent years has been much in the public mind.

As a speaker, Mr. White's striking aptitude for lucid explanation, strong argument, and simple interesting style is immediately recognized. He is an exceptionally clear thinker, a logical reasoner, and an earnest and forceful exponent of economic truths.

Such a subject presented by so able a lecturer should prove of particular attraction to all Technology men, many of whom will some day come in contact with just such economic problems. As a large attendance is expected, tickets should be bought in advance.
