Yesterday the practice was light again, but today in the last practice in Cambridge, the work will be stiffened up. The college men are to be admitted to the practice, and will give the team a good send-off before the big game.

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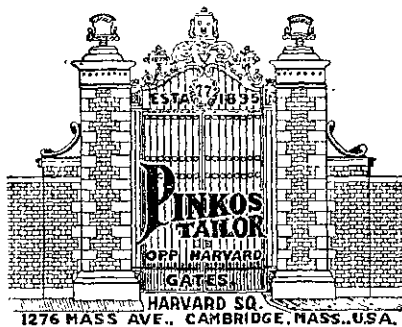
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
