TO THE EDITOR OF THE TECH:

Inasmuch as the news columns of THE TECH are supposedly for the statement of fact unbiased by personal opinion, it seems unfortunate that the account of Field Day in Friday's issue should have been so partial to the Freshmen. That the editor in charge, a Junior, should have expressed his opinion in the editorial column would not have been irregular, but that he should have shown it in his report of the day is certainly unfair to the Sophomores. Any impartial reader who had been a spectator at the Field could not but notice the way 1910's combined superiority and hard luck were flaunted, and attention called to the good luck of the Sophomores in winning anything at all. It is admitted that 1910 did exceedingly well, but 1909 did just as well last year. No mention is made of the Sophomores' setback in the relay, due solely to a Freshman runner, nor is it remarked upon that 1909 came nearer to winning the tug-of-war than any second year class since 1906 in the 1903 Field Day. The very evident fact was stated that the Freshmen would have won the football game if their attempted field goal had been successful; how about the result if the drop kick of the Sophomores had not failed, and the undoubted strengthening of their team if Captain Godfrey had not been unable to play because of injuries?
