MECHANICAL ENG. SOCIETY.

What promises to be the most successful meeting of the Mechanical Engineering Society for the year will be held at the Union Tuesday evening, Nov. 27. At this meeting Mr. W. L. Underwood will give an illustrated talk of one of his most popular tales. It is exceedingly fortunate for the society that they have been able to obtain such an entertaining and prominent lecturer as Mr. Underwood. At the business meeting before the talk the advisability of having a society dinner next month will be discussed and plans formulated for carrying it out. Light refreshments are to be served as usual and the meeting will be called promptly at 8 o'clock.

CIVIC CLUB MEETING.

At a meeting of the Civic Club held Friday evening at the Tech Union an address was delivered by Mr. F. N. Balch.

Mr. Balch first traced the history of Boston's population. At the beginning the city was purely Yankee, then it became mixed with one after another different nationalities until now Boston can be called American but not Yankee. The order of the different nationalities is, Irish, Yankee, Hebrew, Italian. The inevitable ignorance of these foreigners and the criminal indifference of the Back Bay element has rendered Boston's politics a hard problem. There are 116,000 registered voters in Boston and only 74,000 ordinarily come to the polls, and the missing 42,000 represents the swiftest element of the city.

To counteract these two dangers in city politics the Public Information League was started by some young men. This league looked up the different candidates nominated for office, and investigated and printed their records for the information of voters. Soon it amalgamated with, and existed as the Publication Committee of the Good Government Association.

After Mr. Balch's talk refreshments were served.

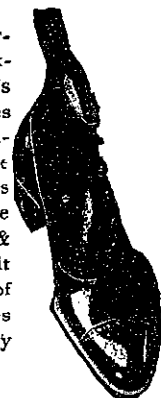
