THE CABOT MEDALS.

Physical Development Encouraged by Yearly Award of Five Medals.

The Cabot Medals are awarded each year to those students who, during the school year show the greatest gain in physical development. The late Mr. Samuel Cabot, a member of the Corporation, offered in 1900 these prizes. It was the donor's desire to impress the students with the value of physical training, and to awaken an interest in gymnasium work. To this end, particular emphasis was laid on the fact that the medals were not to be given for greatest strength, but to the students making the most noticeable improvement in physical development through regular attendance at the gymnasium. The students of the Architectural Department were asked to submit designs for the medals, and prizes were offered for the three most suitable drawings. The medal was designed by Mr. Henry H. Kitson, the noted sculptor, under the advice of Professor Despradelle. The medal is of bronze and three inches in diameter. On its face is the figure of an athlete holding in his right hand a winged victory bearing a laurel wreath, and in his left hand a palm branch. On the reverse of the medal, between two flaming torches, is a miniature of the Rogers Building, with the following inscription underneath:

DEPARTMENT OF
PHYSICAL TRAINING
MASSACHUSETTS
INSTITUTE OF
TECHNOLOGY.

The medal is very fine in design and workmanship, and is much admired and praised by all who see it.

In May, 1901, the Committee on Award of the Cabot Prizes recommended:

1. That the prizes be offered at the beginning of each school year to those students who, in the judgment of a committee appointed by the President, have made marked improvement from attention to physical training during the year.
2. That these prizes consist of bronze medals which shall be known as the Cabot Medals for Improvement in Physical Training and that no distinction of rank be made in awarding them.
3. That the number to be awarded each year be left to the discretion of the Committee of Award, and be determined by the number of men whom the committee shall consider to have made sufficient physical improvement to entitle them to the honor.

The first award of bronze medals was made in 1901 and yearly since that time. Medals will be publicly presented to men who won them last season, in about two weeks at the Saturday night Komers at the Union. Five medals are again offered this year, and their intrinsic worth and the value to the student of the development for which they stand have aroused a widespread and active interest among the undergraduates.

WINTER CONCERT AND DANCE.

Musical Clubs Making Final Arrangements for Annual Event. Tickets now Ready.

Final arrangements are being made for the Annual Winter Concert of the musical clubs to be held in the New Century Building on Tuesday evening, December 18. These annual concerts have proved in the past to be one of the leading social events of the Institute life, and have been well attended and successful in every way. The concert this year promises to be quite as good a production as those of previous years, and it is the hope of the management that every Tech man will lend it his hearty support.

A large number of good men have come out for the clubs this year, practice has been well attended, and a few very good concerts have already been given. The concert to be given this evening at the East Baptist Church in Lynn will be the last one before the Winter Concert, and the men will devote the intervening time to preparation for that event.

A dance, the music for which will be furnished by Poole's orchestra, will be held in Howe Hall immediately after the concert. The program for the concert has not yet been arranged but it promises to contain some very excellent numbers by the various clubs, and also something in the line of extra solos, which have worked successfully in this season's concerts.

Tickets for the concert will be fifty cents, and for the concert and dance, one dollar. These may be procured after today from members of any of the clubs and will be exchanged for reserved seat tickets on Monday, December 17, in Rogers corridor.

ELECTRICAL ENGINEERING SOCIETY.

Mr. Mathew C. Brush, M. I. T. '01, II, gave a very interesting talk to the Electrical Engineering Society Monday evening at the Tech Union.

Mr. Brush's talk was entirely non-technical and he dealt with his experiences in working up to his present position of general manager of the Boston Suburban Company. He outlined his experience as a shop apprentice, as a steamboat clerk, as a general foreman in a small western town, and as an official of the Long Island Railway. He dealt mostly with his idea as to how men in all positions should be treated and dealt with. He believes strongly in self confidence in a man and in the ability to put up a strong bluff when the occasion arises.

Tech men, he said, are mostly criticised because they have not learned the value of friendships and are too much like machines. He thinks that the strongest element of success is not actual knowledge, but a man's personality and his ability to handle men. John D. Rockefeller was quoted as saying that the most valuable thing in a man and the thing least found is ability to deal properly with other men. Mr. Brush also read two poems that were well received. Beer and pretzels were served and after the talk several Tech songs were sung.

TECH SHOW SELECTED.

Work of E. W. James, '07, Accepted for This Year's Production.

The Management of the Tech Show announce the final selection of this year's production. Mr. Edwin W. James, '07, is the author, and it is understood that this year's Show will surpass previous efforts. While it is outside the policy of the Management to announce at this time the name of the production, it nevertheless can be said that the play this year has been written with an idea of pleasing those who desire more or less of the local Show, as well as those who wish to see the Show developed into a more professional production. There will be more of the local hits and specialties this year than heretofore.

The Management wishes to meet all those men who intend to write music and lyrics for this year's Show, and will give them an idea of the plot and assign different subjects for competition in this line. All men interested in this part of the work will meet in 34 Rogers at 1.30 P.M., Saturday, Dec. 8. Too much cannot be said in urging men to come out for this branch of the work, as a man never realizes what he is capable of unless he takes a hand, and it is surprising how many have been developed in this way. There is a good chance for work to be accepted.

BASKETBALL TEAM CHOSEN.

The basketball team for the first game of the season was picked Saturday from the largest squad that has been out for a number of years. Seven players were decided upon to go into this first game, and were measured for their suits. However, the final make-up of the team is still uncertain, and will not be fixed for several weeks. The uncertainty is due to the number of second team men who are showing up well and who may be moved later into regular places.

The team will go into this first contest as follows: Capt. Kinneer, '07, right forward; Cahill, '10, left forward; Pierce, '08, center; Bitler, '07, right guard; Wentworth, '09, left guard. The substitutes are Whitmore, '08, for guard, and Gregory, '08, for guard or center.

H. C. Shoenthal, '05, captain of the 1903 Tech team, who is coaching the team this year, is extremely satisfied with the showing made thus far. He complains of the lack of heavy men, but says that the team will be much better and faster than that of last year. He has been coaching the men very little as yet on team work, but will use this week to develop the team in this respect.

Manager Foster of the second team is now arranging his schedule and has part of it made up as follows: Dec. 7, Boston College at Boston College gymnasium; Jan. 3, Gloucester High at Gloucester; Jan. 5, Malden High at Malden; Jan. 26, Bridgewater Normal at Bridgewater; Feb. 13, Tufts second at the gymnasium; Feb. 16, Mass. Normal Art School at the gymnasium; Feb. 26, Tufts second at Tufts gymnasium, Medford.
