Mr. C. Howard Walker, Director of the Museum School of Design, formerly the School of Design of the Lowell Institute, who was to have spoken at the Kommers last Saturday evening, failed to appear and the men were obliged to furnish their own entertainment. 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DR. VAN DYKE SPEAKS.

Addresses Students at General Convocation on "Manhood."

At a general convocation held Friday at 2 o'clock, President Pritchett spoke of the Christmas holidays, and said that any Tech man who was unable to go home on Christmas Eve would be welcome at that time at the Union, where the usual celebration would be held. He then introduced Dr. Henry Van Dyke, of Princeton, as the speaker of the day.

Dr. Van Dyke took as the subject of his discourse "Manhood." He said in part that to know men is a very valuable gift. It is one which every leader and commander of men must have. And it is also needed by college professors in order that they may know their students. It is possessed by all great writers and painters who portray society to itself.

In alluding to the Negro troops he said that a man must know whether he has reliable men under him or rascals who will band together against rightful authority, to which they have sworn allegiance, to conceal crime among their numbers.

The man who would truly and thoroughly know what is in men must dip down under the externals to find that common life from which all characters are wrought. Courage, penitence, hope, and love; to know these is to know what is in the heart of men. This power was exercised to the full by Jesus of Nazareth, by none before him and by none since. The sociologist and the psychologist have a certain knowledge of human nature, but His was real, due to his personal power of intuitive penetration. This power was due first to His true humanity, and second to his sinless life. Vice perverts ideas and prevents a real comprehension of the heart of one's fellow-creatures. It is the good and pure man who best knows what is in the heart of men.

Christ knew men. What was it that he saw in man? Two things, first, that there is sin that may break out at any time, and must be guarded against constantly, and second, that to offset sin there is in every man more than can be accounted for by psychologist or sociologist; there is a spark of the divine. It links him to a spiritual world by means of which the physical world is transformed. On this scrap of the divine in every man hangs all philosophy.

REHEARSE KOMMERS.

Major Bigelow Entertains Large Party at House in Preparation for Kommers.

The third and last rehearsal of this week's Kommers was held last Saturday night at the home of Major John Bigelow, Jr., Professor of French and head of the Modern Language Department.

Major Bigelow is deeply interested in student life and has always lamented the lack of good fellowship at the Institute, which he attributes in a great measure to the paucity of good student songs.

It has seemed particularly appropriate to him at this time, when the Senior Kommers Book Committee has undertaken to revise the old book, to speak to the students about the value of good songs and jovial singing. With this end in view he has decided to hold a Kommers to illustrate his point and bring it forcibly to the notice of the students. He has collected a large number of student songs of all kinds, and, since the German students are famous for their jollity and singing, a large proportion of these songs have been taken from the student "Kommersbuch."

Twelve gentlemen, among whom are Messrs. Lenz, Meister, Vogel, Raabe, F. Hohl, L. Hohl, Sturm, and Ehret, have volunteered to sing on this occasion and they have been practicing their parts assiduously for some time. The final rehearsal took place last Saturday evening and was made the occasion of a very successful entertainment. The songs were entertained again and again and promise to make a most successful Kommers Saturday evening. Among the pieces rendered were: "Der Wanderer," "Ergo Bibamus," "Gesellschaftslied," "Bummel-lied," "Bierlala," "Krambambuli," "Ruckblick eines alten Burchen," "Der Doktor Eisenbart," and "Die Wacht am Rhein."

To make the affair next Saturday one in which everybody can take part the German songs have been printed and bound into a very attractive pamphlet, which may well be preserved as a memento of the occasion. In introducing each song Maj. Bigelow will explain its history and purport and, when necessary, will translate it into English. Only songs with popular choruses have been chosen and it is most earnestly desired that all the students present will join in and help to make the songs go with a vim.

This promises to be the star Kommers of the term and everyone is urged to buy tickets and get the songs while they last. It is especially hoped that the Senior Committee on Song Books will be present in a body as this Kommers is given for their benefit. The price of tickets will be the same as usual and may be obtained either at the Bursar's window or from the Walker Club Committee. The songs are free.

At the autumn meeting of the National Academy of Sciences, held November 20, 21, and 22, in the new buildings of the Harvard Medical School, Prof. A. A.
