SENIOR CAPS AND GOWNS.

Indorsement by Faculty Only Necessary to Effect Innovation. Portfolio Elections.

If the Faculty sanctions the proposal, the Seniors this year will wear caps and gowns at their graduation exercises. This was decided this week on a vote taken as a rider on the Senior Portfolio ballots, the sentiment of the class being overwhelmingly in favor of the change.

That such an innovation should cause the stir that it has can be better realized when the history of graduation exercises at the Institute is known. In the first ten years of the Institute's life there were no exercises at commencement, the Senior receiving his degree over the desk in the registrar's office in the most matter-of-fact fashion with no formality whatever. The first move toward ceremony was made in 1875, when the degrees were conferred at commencement exercises held in Huntington Hall, at which a number of the graduate students read portions of their theses. From year to year more and more ceremony has been added until now Commencement Week is a round of gaiety.

The question of wearing caps and gowns during this week has been brought up before the Senior classes for the past five years and has been downed each time by a large vote. The opposition during that time has been gradually weakening, due to the constant influx of men from other colleges where the custom prevails. The only time that an action of this kind was taken by the graduating class at the Institute was one year when it was voted that the Seniors wear tall hats. This, however, was not carried out, as a large number of men refused to abide by the vote.

The main reason that the Senior classes never felt kindly toward this custom was that they did not wish to ape other Universities. The Institute has always stood for originality in all of its student customs and to take up this custom would be copying from other schools. The contention of those in favor of the custom has been the democracy of the dress, the cap and gown placing one man on equal footing with another in the uniformity of costume.

How this decision will be treated by the Faculty is not yet known. Some were interviewed and seemed to be in favor of it. If the Faculty should decide to accept the vote of the Senior class which is very probable, many of that body who are doctors will come to the exercises gowned in their doctor's robes. The majority of these received their doctor's degree in Europe where these robes are the most gorgeous affairs.

The Senior Portfolio elections resulted in the choice of the following committee:

John Frank, Hudson B. Hastings, Donald G. Robbins, Phelps N. Swett, Harold S. Wonsen. There will be a meeting of this committee on Friday at 1 o'clock in Rogers Library.

"RISING IN THE WORLD."

Selection from Book by O. S. Marden, Editor of "Success," Read by Prof. Swain.

Professor Swain read on Monday afternoon from "Rising in the World or, Architects of Fate," by O. S. Marden, editor of "Success." The book is one of a series designed to inspire youth to character building, self-culture and noble achievement, and contains many helpful anecdotes and quotations from successful men.

Professor Swain confined his reading to the chapter entitled "Uses of Obstacles," the keynote of which lies in the quotation, "Adversity is the prosperity of the great." Not ease, but effort, not facility, but difficulty, makes men. It is not the victories but the failures of a man's life which bring him success in the end. Thousands of men of great native ability have been lost to the world because they have not had to wrestle with obstacles, and to struggle under difficulties sufficient to stimulate into activity their dormant powers. No effort is too dear which helps us along the line of our proper career.

Mr. Marden, in referring to the conditions of the present day, which tend to hurt a man by removing these obstacles, says:

"This is the crutch age. 'Helps' and 'aids' are advertised everywhere. We have institutes, colleges, universities, teachers, books, libraries, newspapers, magazines. Our thinking is done for us, our problems are all worked out in 'explanations' and 'keys.' Our boys are too often tutored through college with very little study. 'Short roads' and 'abridged methods' are characteristic of the century. Ingenious methods are used everywhere to get the drudgery out of the college course. Newspapers give us our politics, and preachers our religion. Self-help and self-reliance are getting old-fashioned. Nature, as if conscious of delayed blessings, has rushed to man's relief with her wondrous forces, and undertakes to do the world's drudgery and emancipate him from Eden's curse."

MEETING OF ADVISORY COUNCIL.

The Class of '81 presented last week to the Technology Club, and to the Tech Union, a framed photograph of the gate at Technology Field, 18 by 22 inches.

At a meeting of the Advisory Council last Friday night, the Hockey Team was granted the right to use the insignia H.T. in games which it has this year, it being understood that the use of this insignia is not permanent, but only to be used in games. It was also granted the right to arrange a game with West Point if possible.

Messrs. M. Udale, '07, and H. H. Howland, '08, were awarded "T's," having finished among the first seven in the Harvard-Technology Cross Country Run, November 19.

The manager of the Track Team was given authority to arrange an indoor meet with Holy Cross early in March, and a meet with Brown at Boston on May 4.

HOCKEY PLANS.

Advisory Council Authorizes an Institute Hockey Team.

Last Friday night the Advisory Council decided to forego its decision of last year, abolishing hockey at the Institute, but it refused to go so far as to contribute towards the expenses of a team. The members of last year's team, however, voted to continue the sport even if they had to pay their own expenses.

Captain Gould and Manager Kelly have been working hard to form plans for the season, but as yet things are very unsettled both in regard to games and the members of the new team. A challenge from West Point to play on February second has been accepted, and a number of other games are being arranged. The team should have excellent chances in this game for it will have the mid-year vacation during which to get in form.

The prospects for a good team this year are unusually bright so far as material goes, for only one man of all the old players has left the Institute, and there are several good men in the freshman class. The chief difficulty to be encountered will be the lack of a rink for practice, for the management will be unable to secure one on account of the lack of funds. Captain Gould says that they expect to use the various public skating ponds about town unless the Advisory Council changes its decision.

NO FRESHMAN-SOPHOMORE MEET.

The last hopes of those who wished to see a Freshman-Sophomore meet this year were dashed to the ground when the Advisory Council decided at its last meeting not to hold one. It was originally intended by Manager Tobin to hold this meet early in the season, and it would probably have been run off by this time had not Mr. Mahan gone to Princeton with the Cross Country Team. Mr. Mahan's absence made it impossible for Tobin to go ahead with the meeting until recently, when the question came up before the Advisory Council. The time between now and the holidays does not permit it being run off before Christmas, and the regular inter-class meet will be held on January 8. Another objection that was raised to getting the meet off before Christmas was that it would open the indoor track season too early. The track team this year already has a long and hard schedule, and so it was not deemed advisable to start them off too soon.

NATIONAL MUNICIPAL LEAGUE PRIZE

The National Municipal League has established an annual prize of one hundred dollars, to be called the "William H. Baldwin Prize," to be given to the author of the best essay on a subject connected with municipal government. For the year 1906-1907 the competition will be limited to undergraduate students registered in a regular course in any college or university of the United States offering distinct instruction in municipal government, and the topic will be: "The Relation of the Municipality to the Water Supply."
