also of the Advisory Council on
Athletics.

He assumes too much when he
states that "we know for a fact
that there is a manager," for as a
matter of fact there is none. The
captain of the team meant only
that one had been nominated, or
elected by the fencers. This man
accepted the position temporarily
much against his inclination, as he
was carrying a great deal of scho-
lastic work. However he agreed
to assume the duties for the time
being to see whether or not he
could do justice to the position.
Later on finding that he could not,
he tendered his resignation, leaving
the office vacant, and this condi-
tion still exists. Hence his name
was not brought up before the M.
I. T. A. A., and the Advisory
Council on Athletics for approval.

As the man who made these in-
quiries concerning the manager
was a reporter for a newspaper, the
captain did not believe it expedient

to tell who the manager was at that
time.

As to the straightforwardness of
this manager's nomination we be-
lieve the Fencing Team itself fully
capable of electing its own man-
ager without any outside aid,
which, we beg to inform your cor-
respondent, is in full accordance
with the Constitution and By-Laws
of the Advisory Council on Ath-
letics.

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
