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TECH LOSES GAME.

Worcester Polytech Wins by Superior Team Work.

By superior team work the basketball team from Worcester Tech defeated the Institute team on the Friday evening before the vacation at the Gym, the score being 33 to 24. Tech went into the contest with a crippled team, Wentworth being out with water on the knee, while Kinnear was off in his game on account of an old injury. It is doubtful, however, if the Institute team in its full strength could have won against the wonderfully quick and clever passing of the visitors. If the Worcester boys had been better acquainted with the floor and the baskets, their score would have been doubled.

In the first half the home team started off with a rush, but Worcester came back strong. For the first 10 minutes of play the score was even, but as the Worcester five began to get into their team play, the score piled up in their favor, it being at the end of the half, 15 to 7.

In the second half Worcester started a scoring bee in which they added 17 points in short order to their total. Then the Institute team braced and played fast up to the last minute of play, adding 17 points to their score in about two minutes.

For Tech, Bitler and Nichols put up the best game, while Campbell, a man new to basketball this year, played an excellent game during the short time he was on the floor. Among the Worcester players the honors were divided more evenly, every man participating in the scoring. Peters was, however, the man on the spot, his shots in the most part being spectacular and difficult. Wholeau and Lawley were the other Worcester men that distinguished themselves in the play.

In the first half the A. A. U. rules being used, the Institute players were much handicapped thereby, but they had a chance to get back in the second period when the intercollegiate rules were used.

ALUMNI ELECT OFFICERS.

Will Hold Annual Meeting at Hotel Brunswick January 18.

Announcement of the annual meeting and dinner of the Alumni Association has just been given out. The meeting this year will be held at the Hotel Brunswick on Friday, January 18.

The guests will be President Pritchett; Hon. Eben S. Draper, Lieutenant Governor; Dean Wallace C. Sabine, of the Lawrence Scientific School; Frederick P. Fish, of the Corporation; and Prof. Dugald C. Jackson, of the Faculty.

With the announcement of the dinner is given the result of the alumni vote in the second election of candidates for term members in the Corporation. From the eight nominees whose names were on the ballot, the five who received the largest number of votes were: George W. Kittredge, 77; Frank B. Stantial, 79; Eleazer B. Homer, 85; George E. Hale, 90; Leonard Metcalf, 92. 809 votes were cast in all.

DOING GOOD WORK.

A circular recently issued describing the work done in the past two months by the Technology Christian Association shows that the movement has become one of the leading factors in the Institute life. The increase both in size and influence of the association in the past two years has been most remarkable. The report shows that through the information bureau at the first of the year, 75 men secured suitable rooms, 20 men secured employment, and a large number received information in regard to registration and other matters. In the securing of rooms, the men had a list of over 150 carefully selected rooms to pick from, all of these rooms vouched for and highly recommended.

Thirteen hundred handbooks were given out, which means that that number of students were registered on the Y. M. C. A. cards. Through the list thus obtained 800 men were introduced to the churches of Boston. At the present time there are nearly two hundred Tech men taking up Bible study under the auspices of the Tech Association, although the report only gives 125. The work is being held back rather from lack of leaders than from the lack of students to make up the classes. The budget for the year shows that the association expects to expend nearly \$1200. This is used in part in the Bible study work,

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MANAGERS ELECTED.

Athletic Association Elects Fencing and Assistant-Track Managers.

At a special meeting of the Athletic Association held in Huntington Hall on the Friday before vacation the assistant manager of the Track Team and the manager of the Fencing Team were elected for the coming year. The position of assistant manager of track has been open to competition since the beginning of the year. Only three men reported to Manager Tobin, G. L. Lawrence, Jr., R. M. Keeney, and H. Sharp, all '09 men. These men have been working under the direction of Tobin, and their ability and efficiency noted. Tobin read a report on the work done by the men, and, as he had made the better showing, Keeney was elected by a large majority.

Captain Bounetheau of the Fencing Team spoke shortly on fencing and gave out that A. G. Place, '08, had been selected by the team as manager. He asked for official sanction of the election, and Place was elected on a single ballot.

Manager Tobin then gave out the schedule of the Track Team for the winter and spring seasons. The contests are as follows: Interclass Meet, January 8; relay race against Holy Cross at the B. A. A., February 16; dual meet with Holy Cross at the Tech Gym, March 6; spring class games, April 28; dual meet with the University of Maine at Orono, Me., May 4; dual meet with Brown at Tech Field, May 11; New England Intercollegiate Championship Meet, May 17-18. Besides these varsity meets, the team will be entered in a number of the open meets around Boston, notably in the Newton open meet, and that of the Lawrence Light Guards at Medford.

DISCUSS SONG BOOK.

At a large and enthusiastic meeting of the Senior Class held on Friday, Dec. 21, arrangements for Class Day and for a new Song Book were discussed.

Chairman Robbins of the Song Book Committee gave a report of the work which the committee had accomplished. It had been thought best to retain only twenty-six of the songs in the old book and to include in the new a number of well known college songs and three or four of the Tech Show songs which have proved most popular. A question as to whether the Alma Mater songs of the principal colleges, as "Fair Harvard," "Old Nassau," etc., should be included was decided in favor of such songs as the committee should deem desirable. The class then gave the committee authority to go ahead and publish the book.

A long discussion of the election of the Class Day Committee followed. It has hitherto been the custom to put the whole Senior Class on nomination; the twenty-five men receiving the greatest number of votes comprise the committee and those three receiving the highest number of votes become marshals.
