We should like to urge every man with artistic ability to enter the poster competition announced by the Show management. Apart from the money and the honor to be gained, it is important that the management should not be compelled to have the work done by an outsider. The Show's success has been largely due to the fact that it is written, managed, and acted entirely by Technology men. We have not had to seek professional aid before; let us not begin now. Surely we can produce a poster worthy of acceptance.

The first Kommers of this term will be held tomorrow evening at the Union. Those who followed THE TECH's columns last term will note that this is the first Kommers under the new management. Last term they were under the direct control of the Walker Club. Although the Walker Club's management of this important school function was eminently successful, it was thought that it would prove more satisfactory on the whole if the management were in the hands of a body more representative of the students. As the Institute Committee is truly representative of the whole school, being elected directly from all four classes, the Kommers were put in their charge for the coming term.

The general plan of conduction will be the same as in previous years. Each of the four classes will have a special night on which it will furnish the entertainment. There will probably also be special dinners, as, for instance, tomorrow night, when the Civic Club will furnish the program.

The management is changed to this extent, however. Previously

It is essential to the economical management of the Union that an accurate knowledge of the number of men expected should be obtained beforehand, and it is hoped that this new rule will accomplish that result.

Y. M. C. A. MEETING.

At the regular Thursday noon meeting of the Technology Y. M. C. A. held in Trinity Parish Hall yesterday, Mr. Jeliff, an assistant at Central Church, spoke to the men about his experiences in settlement work on the east side of New York. His church was in a very cosmopolitan neighborhood, there being over 200,000 people of nine nationalities within a few minutes walk.

Mr. Jeliff described the conditions there today. There are gangs of toughs which make the streets dangerous, and young boys are thus early schooled in vice. The different nationalities are clannish and while they often squabble among themselves, they all unite against the police. Immorality and intemperance are common. Many of these people seem to lack a sense of right and wrong; but one finds there numbers of men and women who lead sober, honest and Christian lives. The difficulties of reaching the people are great; but personal visits, instruction regarding health, and employment bureaus are effective in teaching them to lead normal lives with a healthy regard for Christian thought and life.

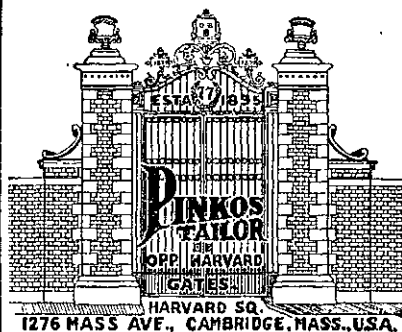

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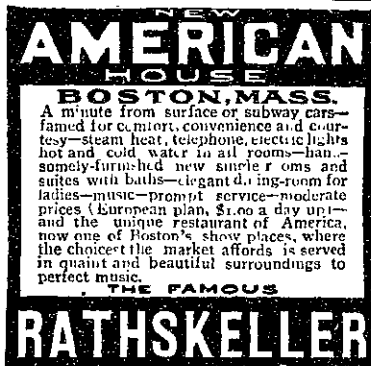
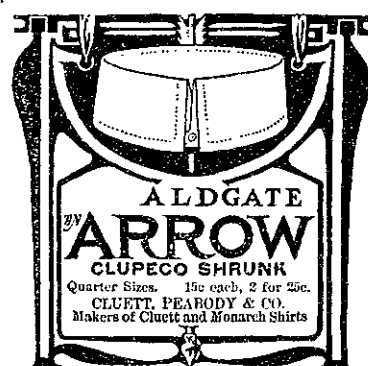
