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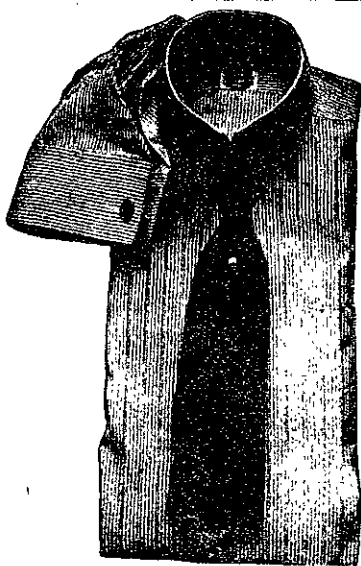

Howland, who surprised everyone last fall in cross country running by carrying off first place in the Tech-Harvard run, will be the strongest man for the Institute in the mile run. He is an ideal indoor runner, fast on the corners, and has a good sprint at the end.

It is expected that Allen will spring a surprise in the high jump. Owing to his attenuated build, he has been dubbed "scissors." Un- a few weeks ago he had no idea he could jump. He entered the indoor games and tied the winner at a fair height in his first attempt. For the past two weeks he has been practicing under John Mahan and has been able to clear heights that are regarded good for an experienced man. In the 440-yard novice are several fast youngsters that have shown up well this year.

Of even greater interest was the exhibition race between two picked relay teams of five men each, and the result inspired great hopes for the B. A. A. race. Moses, '09, Gram, '09, Todd, '08, Gould, '07, and Blackburn, '08 ran for the first team; the second team was composed of Captain Richards, Keeney, '09, Chapman, '08, Fernstrom, '10, and Cummings, '10.

Each man ran two laps and the first team won by nearly half a lap.

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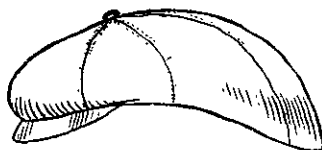
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
