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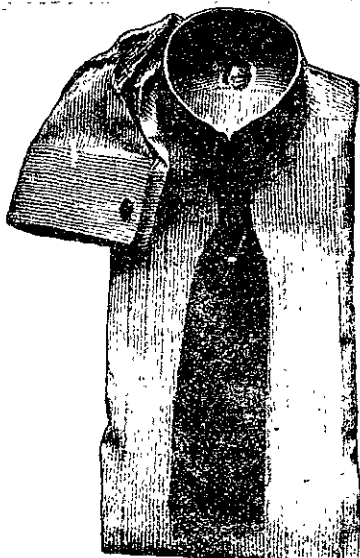
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PLANS FOR PRIZE DRILL.

STEVENS MAKING A RECORD.

Chief Engineer Stevens is trying
to make a record before he turns
the Panama Canal work over to
his successor, Colonel Goethals, as
is evidenced by the following cable-
gram received from him in Wash-
ington: "Culebra. To Secretary
of War, Washington—In twenty-
three working days in February,
excavation on the Culebra cut was
638,644 yards. On same basis full
month would have been 722,000
yards. March should go consider-
ably over 800,000."

evening of March 22.

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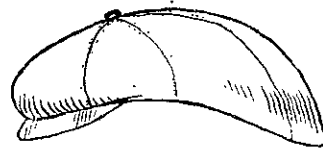
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
