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Y. M. C. A. ELECTIONS.

The weekly meeting of the Tech Y. M. C. A. was held yesterday noon. After the usual preliminaries Professor Winslow of the Biological Department spoke on "Motives." There are many kinds of motives, he said. To begin with, there are incentives of reward and similar things, but these do not generally bring large result. The motives of immediate service to others and of patriotism are perhaps the commonest. After all the underlying motive is that there is a need, and it is in our power to fill it. We do not always realize this but it is always so. Everywhere there is room for improvements as shown by the suffering in the world. Also there is a force to meet this need, working toward good. This power may be called God. It is not external; it works in us and through us. Some people are optimists, and their belief is imperfect because they think the world is good enough. Others are pessimists, and they are useless because they think it is not worth saving. But many men see that the world is worth saving and that it can be improved if they help the work along, and we should join this class and do our best.

Prof. W. L. Phelps of Yale has excited considerable comment by his recent proposal to make an examination on the Bible part of the entrance requirements for every university. He would do this by making the Bible the sole object of the present entrance examination in English. This, he says, would have the advantage of making a uniform system for all colleges and would obviate the present profound ignorance of Bible literature, which is so universal.

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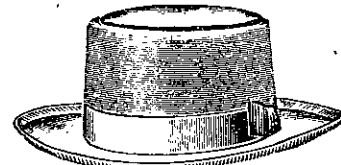
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
