THE TECH regrets to announce the resignation of Mr. A. G. Kellogg, 1909, from the Board of Editors.

The calm and quiet which marked the meetings of the 1909 *Technique* electoral committee, and the celerity with which the editorial board was picked is to be greatly commended. It is indeed better for the book that internal class strife be not aroused over the selection of the men who are to be responsible in this task of publication. The advantages of having the board chosen so early are self-evident. Track athletics offer a chance for individual exer-

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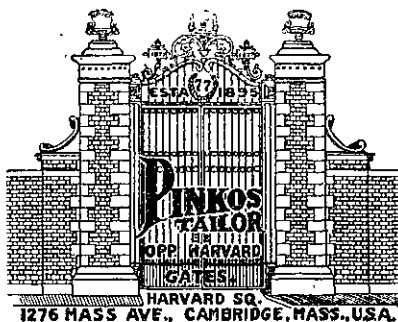
