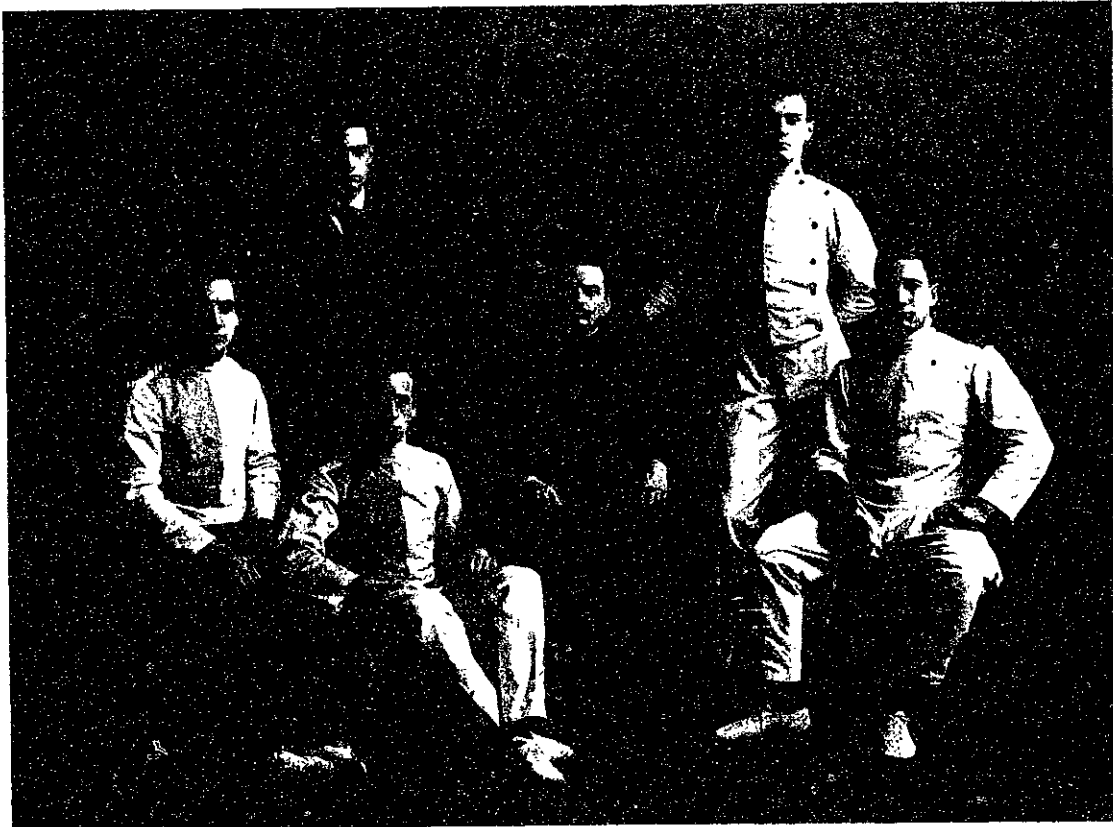
Scholarships.—Each applicant for a scholarship (except a State scholarship) for the ensuing year should hand in his application blank at the Registrar's Office, and leave his name before April 15th on a special card enclosed in an envelope, in Professor Dewey's box in the Registrar's Office. (Blanks and cards may be obtained at the Registrar's Office.) With the name state the class, course, and all free hours for consultation. Each applicant will be notified through the Cage in regard to date selected for consultation. Students applying, therefore, should inquire at the Cage for mail.

State Scholarships.—Applications should be made to the Secretary of the State Board of Education on blanks to be furnished at the State House. While the State Board of Education has full control of the State scholarships, it is customary to submit all applications to the Faculty for endorsement as to standing, and for such advice as other data in the possession of the Faculty may warrant. For this reason, while the Scholarship Committee has no authority to request conference or further information from applicants for State scholarships, it will always be glad to receive and consider all information that may be furnished. In any case, students intending to apply for State scholarships are requested to notify the Registrar to that effect.

COURSE II BASEBALL.

Options 1 and 2 of the Course II Seniors played for the baseball championship of the Course II drawing room Thursday afternoon at the Field. Porter's Heifers representing Option 1 lost to Allen's Colts representing Option 2 by the score of 10 to 6. The championship title accordingly goes to Allen's Colts.

Professor W. T. Sedgwick gave a talk on "Typhoid Epidemics" before instructors in the scientific laboratories of the Institute and the Harvard Medical School, at a dinner of the Bowditch Club.

Tech fencers responded in good shape and defeated the strong Medford trio by one bout.

It was the meet with Princeton that gave great hopes for the Institute team. The 6 to 3 victory over that strong team promised that the Institute would have a first rater in the big triangular contest against Yale and Columbia. In this latter event, Yale showed up extremely strong and carried off first honors, with Columbia a close second, and Tech a poor third. The work of Captain Bonnethean's team in this contest was unexpectedly poor.

One of the strongest arguments for the Institute team in the recent meeting of the Intercollegiate League was that Tech sent a team down to New York in order to be ready if the first action was favorable. It is not probable that Tech would have made a very good showing this year in the big con-

the work being done on THE TECH and *Technique*. He traced the growth of athletics during recent years under the direction of the Advisory Council, and described the new Field.
