"STEIN SONG" BARRED OUT.

Considered Improper for Concert in Methodist Church.

That there should be any objection to the Technology Glee Club's singing Bullard's "Stein Song" at a concert held in a Methodist Church would never have occurred to most Tech men. Yet that is just what the Musical Clubs would be true at their concert in Newtonville Wednesday evening. The "Stein Song" was to have been the final number of an excellent and highly appreciated program; but "The Mulligan Musketeers" was substituted at the last moment by special request of a prominent member of the Massachusetts Anti-Saloon League and several zealous members of the Women's Christian Temperance Union present in the audience.

In all other respects the program was that to be followed in the Spring Concert, where the "Stein Song" will be sung unless the student body rise in protest. The hit of the evening was made by the Mandolin Club, both their numbers being twice encored. Fales was also called back repeatedly for banjo solos.

The New York Club held its second annual dinner at the Union Wednesday evening. About thirty members were present, and they elected officers for next year, as follows; C. W. Coffin, President; C. J. Belden, Vice-president; C. Kurtzman, Secretary; G. W. Cooke, Treasurer; F. J. Friedman, and H. E. Botsford, members of the Executive Committee.

A resolution was passed thanking the retiring secretary, L. A. Freedman, for his services, and recognizing him as the founder of the club.

PICK TEAM AT SPRING MEET.

Coach Mahan Outlines Method to be Employed in Selecting Track Team.

Coach Mahan has written to the Tech a letter in which he outlines the policy to be followed in picking the track team this year, and in which he lays especial stress on the importance of the Spring Meet, to be held a week from tomorrow. A portion of the letter follows: "The winners of the first, and second, and third places in each event of the class games are the men who will make up the varsity team for this year. If every candidate has not made his best effort in training previous to these games there will be more or less dissatisfaction with the result, as this will be the only chance to make the team.

"In order that every man may have a fair try at more than one event, the trials for the 100 and 220-yard dashes and for the high and low hurdles will be held on Thursday, April 18, at 4.45 P.M. In this way all those who do not qualify for the final heats in these events will have a chance to enter other events on Saturday, the day of the games. This will give an opportunity for many men to enter events such as the 880-yard run and the broad jump, in which the Tech team has been weak in the past two years."

Coach Mahan further says, "The distance runs are sure to be worth going to see, as the competition in the one and two mile runs will be keen. A few of the older men who are showing a disposition of overconfidence and neglecting their training will meet some surprises from some of the many younger candidates who are working more faithfully. In the mile there is splendid material. Buckingham and Chapman are both experienced men, but the form which Howland, '08, and Mills, '10, are showing is excellent, and these men are sure to push the veterans to their very best to hold their places on the team. In the two-mile run the competition is even keener, and MacGregor and Callaway will be forced to beat out such men as Howland, Udale, and Huber.

"As to the selection of the men for the various meets this spring, the winners of the first three places in the spring games will be allowed to start in the dual meet with Brown. The men who make a showing in this meet will be taken to Worcester for the Intercollegiate Meet on May 24 and 25. Only the winners of the first two places in the class games will be taken on the trip to Orono to compete against the University of Maine.

"Every day's training now means so much better form a month from now in these collegiate contests, and if the weather makes training at the Field impossible, a little work in the Gym with a short run on the road will be a great help in the trials on the 18th and 20th of this month."

At the University of Minnesota the upper-classmen are thinking of having another rush at which they will charge admission in order to pay for the property damaged in a previous fight.

STRONG JUNIOR TEAM.

Veteran Class Champions again on the Diamond. May Play Faculty.

For a third season the Juniors will have a strong baseball team on the diamond. For two years this class has turned out a championship team, winning not only the class contests, but games with some of the strongest teams around Boston. In the first two class games this year the Juniors have shown their strength by defeating the Freshmen and Sophomores.

Manager Daley is attempting to arrange a contest for his team against one made up of members of the Faculty. At a class dinner last winter Professor Wendell spoke on the athletic ability of certain members of the instructing staff, and expressed an opinion that the Professors could get together a team that would be able to defeat the champion Juniors. This statement Manager Daley took as a challenge, and has asked that the Faculty make good the statement.

It is not known who would be on the Faculty team, but it is known that several of the Professors were crack baseball players in their college days. Bursar Rand put up a good game in his law school days, and was later a member of the Northern Vermont League, playing short stop on the champion team one season. He is willing to play on the Faculty team if one is made up. Prof. Wendell feels doubtful about the formation of the team, but did not deny the possibility.

All but one of the veterans are back on the Junior team. D. B. Myers has been lost on account of his trip to the Aleutian Islands with Professor Jaggar. The first outside game comes on Saturday with Somerville High School.

The schedule is April 13, Somerville High; April 20, Milton Academy; April 27, Lowell Textile School; May 4, Thayer Academy; May 11, Winchester High; April 18, Waltham High. All of the games are on the opponents grounds.

RELAY TEAM CHOSEN.

Final trials for the team to represent Tech at the Pennsylvania Relay Carnival were held at the Field yesterday afternoon. The distance was 400 yards, and a dozen men ran. The track was heavy and the times slow. The men chosen were H. W. Blackburn, '08, H. J. Wertheim, '09, G. S. Gould, '07, C. W. Gram, '09, and B. L. Gimson, '08, substitute.

DR. ALEXANDER SPEAKS.

TO CONTEST FOR "PARIS PRIZE."

As a result of the second preliminary competition for the "Paris prize" of the Society of Beaux Arts Architects of New York, Andrew Rebbri of the Department of Architecture of the Institute was one of the five men to be placed for the final competition. The other four men are T. S. Wagner, O. R. Eggers, H. Wenzell, and G. R. Klinbart, all of the Atelier Hornbostel, New York.

These five men are to go into the final competition which will probably be the finished drawings of some large and important problem. Last year's competition was won by Hiron, a former student of the Institute.
