ENTHUSIASTIC MEETING.

Good Support Promised Track Team.
Collect Sixty Dollars For Band.

Judging by the enthusiasm aroused yesterday at the mass meeting in Huntington Hall called by the Institute Committee, the track team will have the hearty support of the whole Institute, when they meet Brown at the field Saturday.

The meeting was called to order by Lawrence Allen, '07. After calling attention to the probable closeness of the meet and the necessity for the best support from the student body, he introduced President Pritchett as the first speaker.

Dr. Pritchett was greeted with a great show of enthusiasm and it was some time before he could begin. He said in part:

"There are two things that always move me deeply. One is when I return to Boston to have you all greet me so cordially. The other is to look into your faces, recognizing all the human energy and spirit here represented, and think of all my pleasant associations here with you. It is with great regret that I regard my parting—a parting with all the dearest and best things of my life during the last seven years."

The President went on to call attention to the hearty interest he had always taken in athletics at the Institute. In regard to the Brown Meet he said: "In going into this coming meet, everyone should be fully inspired with enthusiasm. We should go into it with a common love of our Alma Mater, and with the maximum of faith, hope, and enthusiasm that all united can give."

After telling a story about the Technology men at Panama Prexy concluded: "Now we are going out to meet Brown on Saturday, and let all Technology men get together and do what they can do—take the flag of Tech, and put it above that of Brown—where it belongs."

Dean Burton spoke next on the value of a large attendance at the meets and the universal support of the fellows.

J. A. Rockwell, '94, who is on the Advisory Council, spoke of athletics at the Institute in the past and urged everyone to take a hearty interest in the best track team that Technology has had for years.

Jenkins, '09, then led the meeting in singing "The Cardinal and the Gray" and "Dear Old M. I. T." Allen then said that a band had been engaged for the meet Saturday and asked everybody to contribute as they went out of the door. Over sixty dollars was collected in this manner.

NO REVIEW HELD.

The M. I. T. Battalion was not inspected Wednesday, since Capt. Michael J. Lenihan, 25th Infantry, the government inspector from Washington, was unable to be present. It is probable that if Capt. Lenihan does not come on Wednesday, May 15, the inspection will consist merely in an examination of the roster, records, and accoutrements of the Battalion.

BROWN vs TECH TOMORROW.

Closest Meet of Season Expected.—Tech's Chances For Victory Good.—Every Man Wanted to Cheer.

Brown and Technology meet Saturday in what promises to be the closest and most exciting contest of the 1907 track season. Judging from the previous performances of the contestants, Tech's chances for victory are good, even in spite of the loss to the team of Gould and Schobinger. The former has had to give up track work and the latter is debarred by the one year rule.

Tech is strongest in the sprints, the high jump, the pole vault, and the two mile, while Brown excels in the middle distances, the hurdles and the remaining field events.

In the 100 yard dash Captain Richards and Gram should run away with the first two places, while Mayhew of Brown should get third. The first two places in the 220 will in all probability go to the same men, while Prout of Brown should be close behind.

The performance of Blackburn at the Penn Relay Games, and that of Gram in the quarter-mile at the Maine meet, running in 52 3-5 seconds on a slow track, seem to assure to Tech the first two places in that event. Prout and Honiss are Brown's most likely entries,

the former being the better of the two.

The half mile is a very doubtful event, but will probably lie between Captain Thurlow of Brown and Chapman and Gimson of Tech. Chapman ran the event last Saturday in 2:06, while the Brown captain in the meet with Williams on the same day, covered the distance in 2:09 1-5. Consideration must be taken of the fact, however, that Thurlow won his event easily and was not pushed to any great extent.

The mile will in all probability be won by Lundell of Brown. The other two places should go to his team mate, Wells, and Buckingham of Tech.

In the two mile MacGregor, who holds the Tech record for it, and Udale, who won the event in the Spring Games, should secure first and second for Technology, though they will meet a hard man in Brown's veteran, Gallup.

Both hurdle events are generally conceded to Mayhew, Brown's largest point-winner this season. In the 120 yard event Albro of Tech should secure second, while Abercrombie of Brown should make a good third. In the 220 event Fernstrom and Albro should run Mayhew a good race.

In the high jump, the Tech veterans Rapelye and Allen each have better than 5 feet 8 inches to their credit. Sturdy is Brown's only entry deserving mention. Mayhew of Brown has done well over 21 feet in the broad jump and he should win that event with ease. Eaton of Tech should be good for about 20 feet.

Orr, with a mark little short of 11 feet, should make a sure first in the pole-vault. Huxford is Brown's best man, and he has not been performing very creditably this season.

The weight events are very uncertain and little can be predicted concerning them. In the hammer throw Scharff and Flagg, of Tech, and Hazard and Smith of Brown are the likeliest point-winners. In the discus throw the first two places should go to Nesbit and Allen of Tech with Kirley of Brown a close competitor. The shot put should be a heavy point-winner for Brown although it is probable that Allen will secure one place in it for Technology.

POPS TICKETS OUT.

The tickets for the Tech Pops, which will come on Tuesday evening, June 4th, are now out. The arrangements for the concert this year are the same as usual, the Commencement Day Committee having bought out the whole house, both floor and balcony. These tickets are to be sold among the Alumni and undergraduates. As the number of Alumni in town at this time is always large on account of the large number of class reunions, the number of tickets that will be on sale for
