It will be remembered that when it was announced that Dean West had been invited to the presidency of the Institute, a great storm of protest from the Princeton men completely turned Prof. West from his intention to accept the Institute's call. There

is indeed grave danger that the same thing will happen in the present case. President Wheeler has practically built up the University of California and he is regarded with the highest admiration by all Californians. If any great pressure is brought to bear upon President Wheeler, it is more than likely that he will decide that his place is with his university, and the Institute will continue in the rut which it has occupied for the past year for some time to come.

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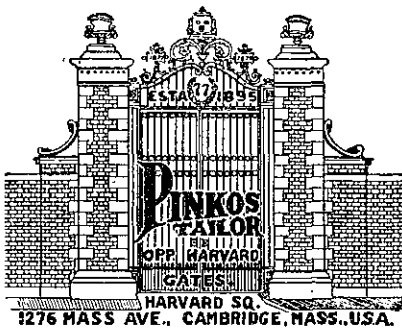
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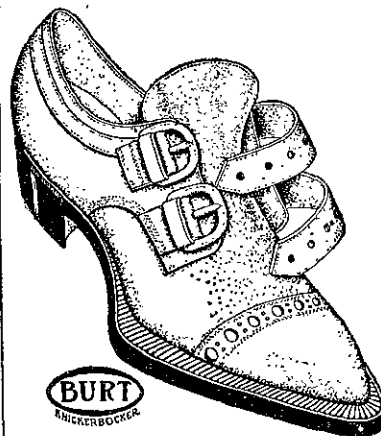
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
