

is received three or four days before the conference. In partial payment of expenses several waiterships worth \$1 per day are available if application is made early to the College Secretary of the Association, 5 Eng. B. Bldg. The Tech Association will also pay the program fee of \$5 for a limited number of men who do not feel able to pay this amount, providing applications are made early enough. Tent accommodations can also be secured at as low a rate as \$1 per person for the entire ten days. It is also possible for men to bring their own tents. The *minimum actual expense* while in attendance at the conference can be reduced then to zero, the only expense being the car fare.

The transient rate for board and room will be \$1.50 per day while the transient rate for program fees for those remaining less than ten days will be sixty cents a day. Reduced rates have been secured on all railroad lines. A round-trip ticket from Boston can be secured for about \$3.75.

HOW TO REACH NORTHFIELD.

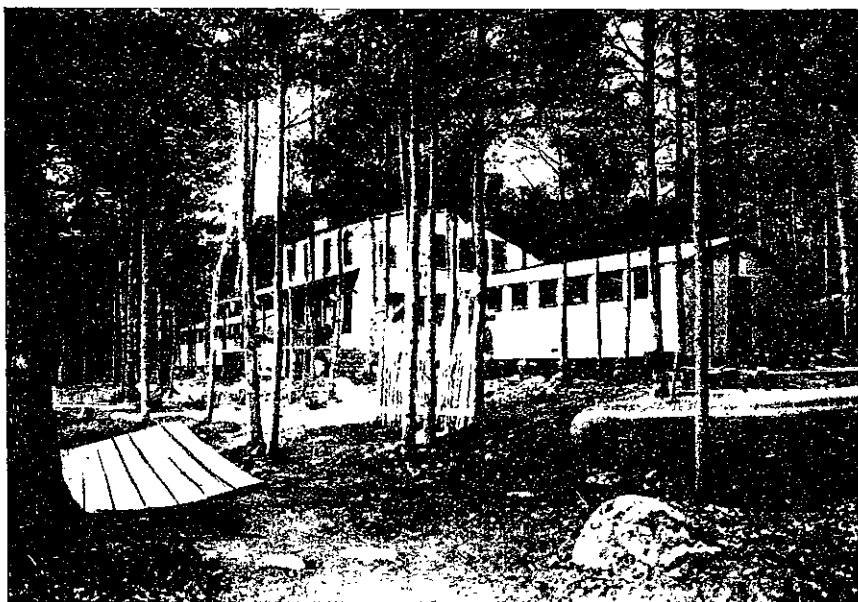
East Northfield is situated on the Connecticut River, near the Vermont and New Hampshire boundary line. Men can leave Boston on the Fitchburg Division

of the Boston & Maine, changing at Miller's Falls for Northfield, Mass., on the Southern Division of the Central Vermont, or changing at Greenfield for South Vernon, Vt., on the Connecticut & Passumpsic Division of the Boston & Maine. The Northfield station is one and one-half miles from the grounds at East Northfield while South Vernon is two miles distant. Hacks will be found at either station for conveyance to the grounds.
