"IT TAKES TIME" SAYS SPEAKER.

Dr. Alexander Says That Short-Cuts Fail.

"It Takes Time to do Things Right" was the subject which Dr. Alexander took for his second talk before the Y. M. C. A. yesterday. He said in part: "God's movements in history, as in the foundation of rocks, takes time. He is never in a hurry. We are always trying to take short cuts. This haste has a reaction. It is breaking down our health as a nation by shortening the period of training for our life work."

"Some things," continued Dr. Alexander, "can be done quietly; most things can't. The short-cut man is a failure at the start. The man is wanted who has served an apprenticeship. He must have not a smattering but a thorough knowledge. It is one thing to get a position; another to hold it down."
