That those men have kept pace with the educational and industrial demands, that they have given the Institute its high reputation among colleges is because, through the teaching of the Faculty and through the traditions of the School, they have been imbued with the character of the Founder, who not only established the Institute of Technology but who created also the Technology atmosphere and spirit. Other college founders have endowed with money; Rogers gave something of far more worth, himself.

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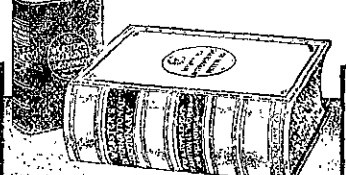
