DR. WILFRED T. GRENFELL.

Tomorrow the Institute students will have an opportunity to hear Dr. Grenfell, who is doing a world's work in a benighted country. His tasks in a poverty stricken land have been probably the greatest in modern missionary work. Everywhere he has been lauded, and honors have been given him by kings. About him a poet writes the following:

THE MAN ON THE LABRADOR.
To Wilfred T. Grenfell.
Calmly we fare on the charted coasts
By the buoy and bell and light;
But long is his watch on the Labrador,
And keenly he lists for the breakers' roar

IN REGARD TO CONDUCT.

Every Institute man at the Convocation tomorrow, for every man should be there, should remember, each and all, the proper conduct for the occasion. The preceding rough-house became so boisterous at the last Convocation last year that a severe reprimand was given the students by the President of the Institute. A number of the instructing staff expressed strong opinions. The Institute Committee was stirred to action, and passed the following resolutions:

"Whereas: At the last Convocation there were many evidences of ungentelemanliness such as the use of horns and bells, the throwing of missiles, hissing and undue demonstrations at the appearance of ladies at the door,

"Resolved: That hereafter all demonstrations shall be made only by the use of hands or mouth eliminating the use of all horns, whistles, etc.

"That the throwing of any kind of objects or missiles be strictly prohibited.

"That hissing be prohibited.

"That ladies be treated with the respect due them.

"That the members of the Institute Committee be marshals to enforce the above regulations at any and all Convocations."

Since the Institute Committee is the official governing body on student matters, it has a right to pass such resolutions. It should keep in mind the last clause in regard to members of the committee being marshals at the Convocation.

TECH SHOW MANAGEMENT.

An auditing and advisory committee to the show management is a step in the right direction. As is said in the statement from the management in this issue the show has become so great in size and scope that the responsibilities attendant to the various positions on the staff are almost too great for a student at the Institute.

Under the past regime the responsibility for the various appointments has fallen on the general manager. This vesting in one man the power of selection has called forth at times criticism and harsh talk about favoritism, unwarranted in great part.

From time to time there has also been criticism of the financial policy of the show. The policy in the past has been in most part the best that the management could formulate. It cannot be expected that partially experienced student-managers can lay down as wise a policy as experienced business men.

The suggested committee, modified as it probably will be after discussion, will undoubtedly relieve the managers of much responsibility and silence much unwarranted criticism.

For the alumni member of this committee THE TECH wishes to suggest M. L. Emerson 1903, general manager in 1903, and connected with the show during his stay at the Institute. He is in a position to give the time and good advice to the show.

REVIVE ST. ANDREW CHAPTER.

To revive the old Technology Chapter of the Brotherhood of St. Andrew was proposed at the meeting of the Episcopal men at the Institute on Sunday evening in Trinity Parish House. This brotherhood is a national organization of Episcopal churchmen.

Dr. Alexander Mann and Reverend R. Kidner of Trinity Church offered their services to forward the movement. They also offered the church to any of the Technology organizations.

Professor R. H. Gardiner of the National organization spoke on the purpose of the brotherhood, the bringing out the better man in more men. He said that most colleges have chapters including strong charges at Yale and Cornell. Technology had a strong chapter a number of years ago.

At the close of the meeting it was decided to hold a cooperate communion on next Sunday morning at 9 o'clock in Trinity Church. There will be an organization meeting in the Rectory, at 233 Clarendon Street in the evening at 8 o'clock.

All Technology Episcopalians are urged to be present both at the Communion Service and the meeting.
