AMHERST APPROVES ALUMNI HOUSE.

The proposed establishing in New York City of a New England College Club, which was mentioned in a recent issue of THE TECH, has been indorsed by the alumni of Amherst, who at their last dinner appointed a committee of five to formulate as a source of membership the alumni of Amherst, Brown, Dartmouth, Wesleyan, Williams, and Tech. It is suggested that these six colleges unite in the erection and equipment of a nine-story building in the club house district, north of Forty-second street, the cost to be borne, 65 per cent by a permanent mortgage and 35 per cent by small denomination second mortgage bonds offered to the 5000 or more alumni living in or about New York; the club house to be built and owned by a holding corporation formed for the purpose.

ELECTRICAL DEPT. MAKES ADDITIONS.

Prof. Derr Designs Projecting Oscillograph.

The electrical engineering department has added a projecting oscillograph to its extensive equipment of lecture-demonstrating apparatus. This oscillograph, the idea of which was suggested by Prof. Derr, was constructed and set up by the department and is used by Prof. H. W. Smith in his lectures. It differs in principle from the ordinary oscillograph in that the vibrator consists of a straight single conductor of small brass wire instead of a loop of copper strip. When an alternating current is sent through this conductor, suspended as it is in a strong field, it will vibrate in synchronism with the current. Rigidly fixed to the top of this vibrator is a round mirror, which receives light from an arc lamp, reflects it on to rotating mirrors and then on to the screen twenty-five feet away. Thus the mirror oscillates in a vertical plane in much the same way as the smaller type oscillates in the horizontal plane, although in the case of the projecting oscillograph, the free period of vibration is comparatively slower than in the small type so that irregularities in the wave form are not projected. The instrument gives a good sine wave and is more especially adapted to showing the various phase relationships in alternating current circuits.

Seven General Electric alternating current instruments of the new shielded type have been received for the standard laboratory. Three motor generator sets have also been received for this laboratory from the American Telephone and Telegraph Company.
