PARK PROGRESS.

Mr. John R. Rabbin, head of the engineering department of the Metropolitan Park Commission, was the speaker at the meeting of the civil engineering society Wednesday afternoon. His talk on the engineering features of the Metropolitan Park system was illustrated with a large stock of lantern slides and gave a comprehensive idea of the magnitude of the work accomplished by the commission during the last ten years. The most interesting features from a technical point of view were the bridges and sea-walls. Nearly all of these have been built since the introduction of reinforced concrete construction and many of them are beautiful examples of the application of this work.
