CLASSES BATTLE AT GYM TONIGHT.

INDOOR MEET PROMISES CLOSE CONTEST.

1908 Has Best Chance But Will Not Have Things All Its Own Way.

The Seniors seem to have the advantage in the class championship meet tonight. There are a lot of strong entries from 1908. The Sophomores have some good men and will push the Seniors hard for first place, as 1910 is very strong in sprinters and middle distance men. The closest contest between classes will probably be that between 1909 and 1911 for third place. There is practically no choice between them.

A number of men came out yesterday for the first time this year. There may be some exceptional men among them.

The 440-yd. dash will be good training for the relay team that will represent Tech against Williams in the B. A. A. games Feb. 1. The mile run should give some indication of what Tech will have to show in the distance events next spring.

The events are as follows, with entries: The 35-yd. dash will be a Freshman-Sophomore race with Seligman 1911, who won the 100-yard dash in the Fall meet and Fernstrom 1910, who won a point at Jamestown last summer. The other innovation, Tech ice cream. This Salisbury 1911, Blackburn 1908, and D. R. Stevens 1911.

In the 440-yd. dash Blackburn 1908 is the favorite, as usual. He will have to run to beat Salisbury 1911, Fernstrom 1910, and H. G. Ruggles 1908, the winner of this event in the Fall games in 1906. Cummings 1910, Lockett 1910, and Gimson are also entered.

The half-mile promises the best race on account of its uncertainty. Gimson 1908 usually wins this race, but now has a strong rival in White 1911. McKenzie 1910, who won the 8-mile han-

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CIVILS IN LINE FOR COPLEY HALL UNION.

Add Strong Resolutions to the Endorsements of the Project.

Wednesday evening the Civil Engineering Society held a dinner and evening meeting at the Union. The society endorsed by a large majority the resolutions drawn up by a committee approving the Copley Hall Union movement. It also voted that the president appoint a committee to obtain a hearing for the society's article in Technique.

Mr. W. S. Johnson gave the talk of the evening on the disposal of sewage and factory waste. He confined his attention to the method of intermittent filtration, as practiced in Massachusetts, and showed many interesting lantern slides to illustrate his statements. In his opinion this field still offers large opportunities for the engineer, as the processes used are by no means perfect, and while better than any others, are giving only partial satisfaction.

The resolution drawn up by the Copley Hall committee reads as follows:—Whereas:—A movement has been started by the Institute Committee and the Board of Editors of The Tech to urge the use of Copley Hall, temporarily, as a Walker Memorial, and

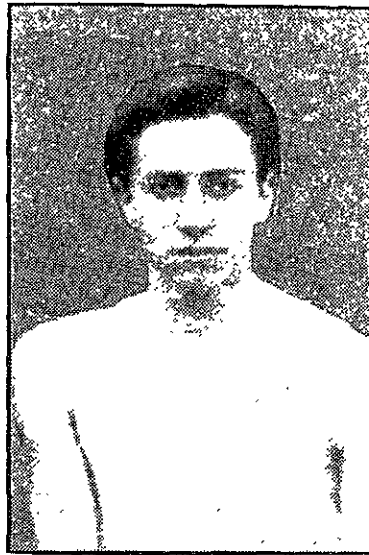
A squad of eight men will leave tomorrow morning with the intention of coming back with much the larger part of the score. Our probable line up will be:—

ELLIS IS CROSS COUNTRY CAPTAIN.

TECH CRIPPLED BUT HOPES.

Loring who has been unable to fence for the past five weeks on account of ill health. Loring is far superior to any other fencer at the Institute.

The team will be made up of F. J. Lange 1909, J. W. Nickerson 1909, and V. C. Grubman 1909. Lange was a member of last year's team and promises to show up well. Nickerson and Grubman are both new men. Nickerson fenced before entering the Institute and has developed rapidly this year. Grubman won both interclass individual championships. He has never fenced before this year, but has trained every day since the beginning of the term.

The judges are Mr. Breckenridge of Harvard, and Mr. A. P. Cushing, the Mexican consul here.

The fencing team is one of the most important teams at the Institute and needs the support of every member of the student body. The meet is scheduled for eight o'clock, and everybody should turn out. Tickets are on sale at the Cage.

The team cannot stand for all of this extra expense so it falls back on the students at large. THEY ARE NOT ON.

Numerals Still Missing from Cups at Union.

The numerals of 1909 and 1910 are not yet engraved on the Field Day loving cup. This cup was presented to the Institute by Mr. Samuel Cabot. On it are 50 wreaths, in which the numerals of the class winning Field Day are engraved. 1909's victory is more than a year old, while 1910 won their right to a wreath two months ago. It would be too bad to forget who won the last two Field Days.

There is also a silver cup at the Union with the inscription M. I. T. A. C. Class Championship 1899. The first meet recorded is that of the year 1888-9, won by 1890, the last recorded is for 1898-9, won by 1901. There is no record for the year between 1888-9 and 1893-4. The numerals of the winning class are engraved on bangs in the form of shields, hung around the base of the cup.
