Y. M. C. A. HEARS DR. McELVEEN.

Pastor of Shawmut Church Gives Idea of Man's Infinity.

In his talk before the weekly meeting of the Tech Y. M. C. A. yesterday, Dr. Wm. McElveen spoke on "The Life of the Spirit." He discarded the idea that God alone is infinite, and advanced the opinion that man is also infinite. There is no man today and there never has been one, who was so complete in every way that he might be called "finite."

The development of everything and everybody is in accordance with a fixed rate of advancement. Everything is "becoming," to quote an early philosopher. Dr. McElveen pointed out the necessity of developing the spirit, as well as the mind and body, whether it be done as part of any recognized creed, or secretly and unknown. He closed by urging the men to apply the fundamental ideas of God to their daily work, and to remember that they too are merely undergoing a process of "becoming."

TRANSMISSION AT RECORD VOLTAGE.

Mr. Neall Addresses Electrical Engineering Society.

Fifty-five members of the Electrical Engineering Society heard Mr. N. J. Neall 1900, of the firm of Thomas & Neall, Electrical Engineers, at the meeting of the society last night at the Union. He gave a very interesting and instructive talk on high tension transmission as a problem in design. As a specific reference he gave a general outline of his personal experience in the design of a 200 mile, 18,000 kilowatt line near Wilmington, N. C. The troubles, both scientific and economic, and mastering of them proved very interesting.

The power house came first. Here, hydraulic power is transformed into electric current at 60,000 volts pressure. After the drawing up of the specifications for the dynamos, switches and transformers came the problem of advantageous arrangement. At this stage of the game, Mr. Neall was greatly aided by an architect whose constant experience in arranging showed to very good advantage, despite the fact that he did not know what he was doing.

In the transmission line, an entirely new iron pole construction was developed, the advantages of which Mr. Neall clearly showed. It consisted in turning exactly upside down the old "delta" construction, placing the ground wire, a lighting protector, on top of the pole.

All through, he showed that the principal trouble met with in engineering is the lack of confidence of stockholders or capitalists caused by their misunderstanding. He gave many instances of his conflicts, compromises, victories, and defeats in his relation with them.

All greatly enjoyed and appreciated the talk. After some questions were answered by Mr. Neall, a vote of thanks was unanimously tendered him for the time he had given them.
