heavy in hours at the college as they are here. But the time of home study can not be the same.

One of the best methods used there and not here is the doing of all problems at school under the direct supervision of instructors. All students do not work the same problems. This makes the circumstances similar to those met in engineering offices. It would be rather difficult to adopt this system at Tech because of the lack of room under present conditions.

There is plenty of room at Cornell. The Physics building has been recently turned over to the electrical department which very easily accommodates the one hundred seniors they have. Still it is very advantageous to have the laboratory compactly arranged in our room as here at Tech.

The spirit is unquestionably better at Cornell. Every one of the seniors in electricity is a member of the local student branch of the American Institute of Electrical Engineers.

These inspections are very energetically carried out by the Tech Electrical Department. Professor R. R. Lawrence made a trip a year ago and Prof. F. A. Laws will visit Cornell in two or three weeks. Professor H. H. Norris, head of the department at Cornell, was here at the time of the Yale-Harvard game.

"One thing is certain," Prof. Schaad says, "Cornell turns out men who know how to work the one object of Tech, and nothing more could be desired."
