The Tech regrets to announce the resignation of Henry William Hoole 1908 from the position of editor-in-chief. Channing Turner 1908 has been elected to fill the position thus vacated.

A NAME.

A number of times in more or less prominent positions The Tech has referred to Copley Hall as a "temporary Walker Memorial." This sounded like a reasonable name but on further consideration it seems a mistake.

"Walker Memorial" is a term originated to describe a definite object of as worthy a nature as anything that the Institute could well accomplish. Accordingly the words should only be associated with this object, with a building designed to be a sufficient and permanent memorial of General Walker.

"Temporary" is an unfortunate adjective when applied to any welcome development. If anything it tends to belittle the Copley Hall project. Besides, a "temporary memorial" is neither logical nor in good taste.

Without doubt a distinctive name is needed for the Copley Hall building. One name should be decided upon and then used consistently. Since the new building will take the place of the present Union and more adequately fulfill the other's purpose, since it will not be a makeshift but an improvement, instead of "temporary Walker Memorial" it might better be called the New Tech Union.
