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A PH.D. IN GEO-PHYSICS.

Dr. Sosman Goes to Carnegie Institution.
Use of Gas Thermometer His Work.

Dr. R. B. So-man, formerly connected with the research laboratory of physical chemistry, who received the doctor's degree from the institute last June, and who has been for the past year in the office of A. D. Little of this city, has accepted a position at the Geo-Physical Laboratory of the Carnegie Institution in Washington.

This laboratory undertakes investigation of the processes involved in the formation of rocks and minerals; and under the remarkably efficient management of its director, Dr. A. L. Day, an unusually complete equipment has been assembled for the study of chemical equilibria at high temperatures and high pressures.

Dr. Sosman's research will consist in the extension of the use of the gas thermometer to very high temperatures, a thing of utmost importance for high temperatures.

OPTION SECURED.

Alumni House in New York Growing.

Six New England colleges, represented by a joint committee of their alumni, have secured an option on the seven-story building at 48-50 West 54th street, New York, and propose to purchase and reconstruct it as a co-operative clubhouse for the New York alumni associations of the colleges, which are Amherst, Brown, Dartmouth, Massachusetts Institute of Technology, Wesleyan and Williams. The enterprise will be financed by the formation of a holding company, each club subscribing for a portion of the stock. It will be necessary to pay off two mortgages on the property, but the committee is confident that the income from the associations will from the start be ample to pay all the expenses, including the fixed charges. Tech is represented on the committee by Allston Sargent, secretary of the New York Technology Club.
