FOR FAIR COURSE REPRESENTATION.

CLAIM ADVOCATES OF SENIOR TICKET.

Many Men on Class Day Ticket Against Movement. A Variety of Opinions.

It seems that the movement among the seniors for a course ticket for the Class Day committee is made up of various parts.

On the whole it would seem from the statements of those connected with the movement that the ticket is not a "drive" against secret societies. Others connected with the movement, however, say that the ticket and the caucuses were intended to be against fraternity men.

The Course I men on the ticket were not very much in favor of the movement. L. B. Ellis would say little except that he considered the matter a "huge joke." C. H. Boylston said that the nominations had been made without the knowledge of a number of the men on the ticket. He believed that if any attempt were to be made to secure course representation on the committee, that notices of the meetings of the various courses should have been posted so that everyone in the different courses should know about the matter, and the representatives should have been put up publicly. He said that to him the movement seemed to be an attempt on the part of "a bunch of the fellows to ring themselves into office."

A Course II member felt that the movement was not against fraternity men. All that he knew about the movement was that his name was on the ticket. He gave as reason for the movement that it was to elect men to the committee who had worked for their class and had not, in the past, had a show. He said, "It was foolish to say that those men did not know about being nominated. Practically every man knew his name was on the ticket."

Leo Loeb in a letter to The Tech said, "I feel it my duty in justice to many men identified with the plan for a square deal in class affairs to state that your correspondent made an absolutely false statement when he characterized the movement as a 'drive' against secret societies."

Bradford of Course III said that neither he or Gibbons knew anything about the matter until it appeared in The Tech. He said further that he would refuse to accept the position if offered to him.

The Course IV men have expressed their opinion of the movement in a communication in another column.

R. E. Drake of Course V said, "The Tech was wrong in the statement that Courses V and X combined in a caucus. Every man in Course V, about 20, and only those in Course V, was present at the caucus held last week in Walker. The movement in Course V was only that by concentrating their votes they would stand more chance of having one or more of their men on the committee and thus secure a fair representation in the make-up of the committee. There was nothing said at the meeting about fraternities and fraternity men, and as far as I know they had nothing to do with the election."

H. S. Chandler of Course X was of the opinion that Courses I and II ran the senior elections. Since they were the larger courses they could easily elect their men, and as Course X had only fifteen men in 1908 they were unable to get enough votes for their men. Thurlow had the idea that the senior caucus was perfectly fair. He did not think that either courses or fraternities had anything to do with the trouble. Thurlow further said that Courses V, VI and X got together and nominated the men they thought best fit to represent them.

The Course VI men would say nothing in regard to the movement, except that The Tech had printed a lot of misinformation.

Joseph Pope of Course XIII said that the movement had grown up from a

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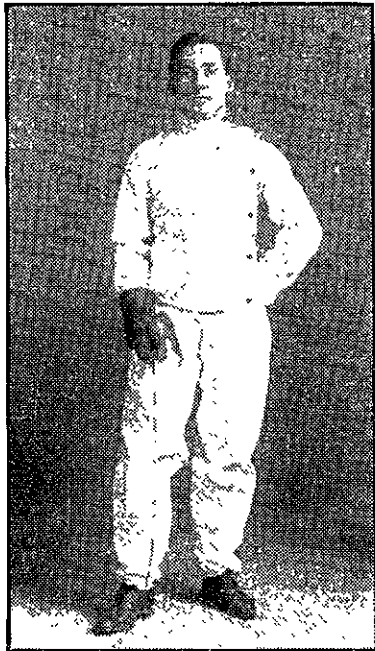
YALE AND TECH QUALIFY FOR FINALS.

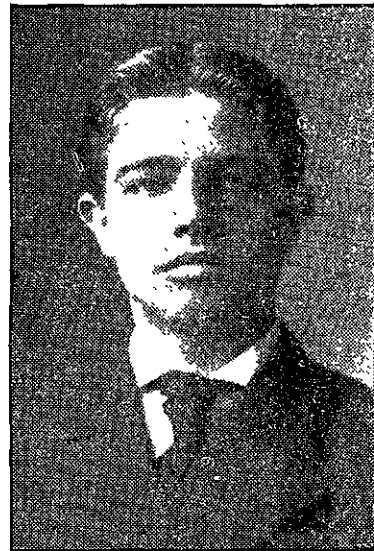
FINE LIST OF GAMES.
