several years. Then to further the interests of the Cross Country team, at that time self-supporting, a merger was made between the latter and the Hare and Hounds Club, which resulted in the present Cross Country Association.

As the team no longer pays its own expenses and is financed and controlled by the Athletic Association, the need for this merger disappears. Since however, the interests of the team and the Hare and Hounds Club are much allied, it would seem advisable to make the captain of the team president ex-officio of the club.

The provisional Constitution, on which action will be taken today, is as follows:

Membership—Any student of the Institute may become a member by paying the annual due of 50 cents.

Officers—The officers of the club shall be a president, a chase-captain and an assistant chase-captain.

The president—He shall call and preside over all meetings of the club.

The chase-captain shall have exclusive control of all Hare and Hounds chases. He shall have no authority to organize races where insignia of any sort are given. He shall act as secretary of the club.

The assistant chase-captain shall take the place of the chase-captain in his absence. He shall perform such duties of the chase-captain as the latter may require.

Election of officers—The captain of the Cross Country team shall be the president ex-officio. The chase-captain and the assistant chase-captain shall be elected by members of the club, the election of both officers to take place in February.

FRESHMEN TACKLE SKIRMISHING.

Skirmish drill was taken up by the Freshman battalion last Wednesday afternoon for the first time this year, the period being spent in deploying as skirmishers, rallying, assembling, and attacking.

Since the beginning of the second term the battalion has been taking up very few new movements, most of the time being spent in preparing for the prize drill, which will come some time in May.
