NINE NEW CANDIDATES OUT.

Infrequent Practice on Account of Full Schedule.

At a meeting of the 1910 baseball candidates Friday Manager Billings called attention to the loss this year of several men to the team. Maxcy who pitched on the team last year will fill the same position again but he is the only available man for the place. The manager urged all who have any pitching ability to come out for the team.

Opportunities are also good in the other positions. Attention was called to the fact that the chances of winning numerals in baseball are very good as they are awarded to fourteen or fifteen men on the team winning the inter-class series.

Regular practice will begin at the Field in about a week, though the batteries will start work previous to that time. During the season only one practice a week will be held on account of the great number of games on the schedule.

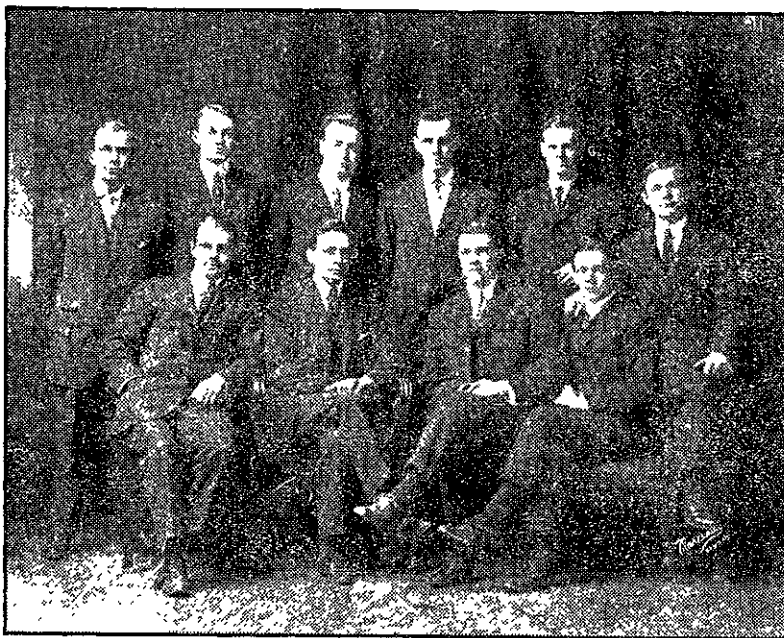
SIXTEEN MEN ON RUN.

ELECTRICAL ENGINEERS TO SEE NIAGARA FALLS.

LEAVE BOSTON TOMORROW.

Trips Will Include Stops at Albany, Schenectady and Buffalo.

Professors G. C. Schaad and H. E. Clifford will take twenty-five of the senior electrical engineers on an inspection trip through Schenectady, Niagara Falls and Buffalo this week. This will be the first time this tour has been taken by the course. It has been the practice in former years to go to New York and Schenectady. The steam electrical engineering inspection now going on at the "L" street power station will take the place of the similar inspection usually made at New York and the added Niagara Falls trip will give an opportunity for a study of hydro-electric construction.

The total cost of the trip will be, at a minimum, \$35. The schedule which takes up a week beginning Tuesday of next week is as follows:

Tomorrow 4.34 P. M., leave Trinity Place for Albany. Purchases individual tickets. Albany headquarters, Keeler's hotel.

Wednesday, 8.00 A. M., leave Albany for Schenectady via electric line. The day will be spent at the works of the General Electric Company. Return to Albany Wednesday evening.

Thursday, 8.00 A. M., leave Albany for Schenectady via electric line. Thursday morning will be spent at the works of the General Electric Company, and the substation of the Schenectady Railway Company. In the afternoon the works of the American Locomotive Company will be visited. Leave Schenectady for Buffalo at 10.36 P. M.

Friday and Saturday, March 27 and 28, will be occupied with visits to the plants of the Niagara Falls Power Company, the Ontario Power Company, the Niagara Falls Hydraulic Power and Mfg. Company, the International Paper Company, the International Acheson Graphite Company, etc.

Monday, March 30, visit the Buffalo sub-stations, the Buffalo Smelting Works, the pumping station of the water works, and the plant of the Lackawanna Steel Company. Leave Buffalo for Boston at 10.00 P. M.

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MARSHALSHIP QUESTION DIVIDES SENIOR COMMITTEE.

SETTLEMENT SEEMS DOUBTFUL.

Class Day Committee Halved as to Election of Three High Offices. Referendum to Class Likely.

Much divided is the senior Class Day Committee and the senior class on the question whether the marshals should be the three men receiving the greatest number of votes. Many claim that the men securing the greatest number of votes were not the men desired by the class as marshals. Others say that it was understood in the recent elections that the men polling the largest vote were to be marshals and the class voted accordingly.

The members of the committee who claim that the high vote should not make the marshals advocate not any change effected by the Class Day committee, by majority rule, any change from the implied placing of the high men, but rather a referendum vote of the class. This feeling seems to be existent among a large body of the class.

On the other hand it is claimed that the traditional method of selecting the marshals has been the elections to the marshalships of the men securing the greatest votes in the committee elections. Their claim is that this was the method implied in the recent elections, and should be followed this year. The fairness of the method of referring the matter to the class has been recognized by these claimants. Also it is strongly advocated by the members of the committee who desire a following of the traditional rule that in case of a serious split in the Class Day committee over the matter, that referendum vote be taken by the class.

The tradition that the high men should be elected marshals has been broken down several times. An extraordinary case that has been cited is selection for first marshal last year of a man not voted on by the class, and not a member of the committee. In case the committee voted unanimously for such an action.

At present the committee seems to be split on the question with little likelihood of any very unanimous agreement. The only thing that has been cited as binding the committee to any special action is the motion recently carried in class meeting that the Class Day committee be elected by popular vote as in the past. Nothing was said in this motion nor is there anything in the constitution touching on the election of the marshals.

At the meeting of the committee on Friday afternoon the only business done was that of securing procedure. F. H. McGuigan was elected temporary chairman in the absence of President Rapelye and Harry Webb was elected secretary. A committee made up of E. I. Williams, H. T. Gerrish and R. E. Drake was named to draw up a constitution. The committee will meet on Monday at 5.00 in 22 Rogers.

MINERS OUT FOR MEMBERS.

At the recent meeting of the Mining Engineering Society, with twelve members present, nine new men were proposed for membership. Financial conditions were discussed and a committee was appointed to look up Course III men in the three upper classes who have not joined the society.

COURSE VI GRAD GOES TO MANILA.

Young took the civil service examinations recently with a number of others, and a few days ago received the appointment.
