TRACK SCHEDULE SHOWS PLANS FOR FULL SEASON.

FOUR MEETS AT THE FIELD.

Class Games, Two Dual Meets and Intercollegiate on List.

The Technology track team will have a very full season this year with one class meet, two dual meets, and the New England Intercollegiate meet on their own grounds. The relay team is also scheduled to appear in the New England college race at the Pennsylvania Relay Carnival.

Manager D. C. McMurtrie 1910 announces the following schedule, complete for the season.

April 11—Spring Class games at the Field.

April 25—Relay games at Philadelphia.

May 2—Tech-Maine Dual meet at the Field.

May 9—Tech-Brown Dual meet at the Field.

May 22 and 23—Intercollegiate meet at the Field.

For some time now the team has been working at the Field. The sprinters have up to the present time confined themselves to work on the grass, and the distance men have done some cross country work. The track has necessarily been a little soft.

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CONTRACT DRAWN UP FOR N. E. I. A. A. MEET.

TO BE AT TECH FIELD.

Athletic Association to Receive Half Profits of Meet.

The contract for the New England Intercollegiate meet which was drawn up at a recent meeting of the special committee of the association with Manager D. C. McMurtrie of the Tech track team has now been finally signed and approved. The committee that had the matter in charge was composed of Manager George D. Taylor of Brown, Manager William H. Hoch of Williams, and Manager H. W. Cowee of Dartmouth.

The contract provides that half of the net profits of the meet shall be given to the association by the M. I. T. A. A. and that the share of profits thus turned over shall be at least one hundred dollars. If any records are broken special medals are to be given to the men establishing them, and the cost of these is to be borne equally by the M. I. T. A. A. and the N. E. I. A. A.

In order to prevent the horde of college journalists who usually invade the field being much in evidence there can be but one duly accredited representative from each college. This man will be given a seat in the press stand. Every effort will be made to keep off the field men who do not belong there, or who are not taking part in an event in progress at the time.

Special effort is being made by the M. I. T. A. A. to have the field and apparatus in the very best of condition for the meet.

FENCING TEAM OFF FOR INTERCOLLEGIATE FINALS.

TODAY AND TOMORROW.

Six Teams Qualified in the Elimination Rounds.

Technology's fencing team will leave Boston this noon for New York, where it is to enter the annual meet of the eastern collegiate fencing association, to be held today and tomorrow at the New York Athletic Club.

The team won the right to compete in the meet by qualifying in the preliminary round held here in Boston a short while ago at the Gym. Preliminary rounds were held in other cities at the

same time.

The teams that qualified in these bouts will enter the meet in New York.

The teams that came through the elimination round are those from Yale, West Point, Annapolis, Cornell, Columbia and Technology. The teams that were disqualified from further competition were those from Princeton, University of Pennsylvania, and Harvard.

The object of these preliminary bouts was to have contests as convenient as possible for the colleges concerned to prevent the necessity of teams which would have no chance in the final meet taking the trip to New York. It will also save a great deal of time in the meet.

Tonight two teams will be eliminated from further competition, and the remaining four teams fight it out for the championship tomorrow afternoon and evening.

The team has been given permission to wear the letters T F T, and the men going to New York will have this insignia on their sleeves.

The team that will go on the trip will be composed of Captain E. M. Loring, J. M. Nickerson, F. J. Lange, V. C. Grubman (substitute), Manager A. L. Moses and Coach Lucien Fournon will accompany the team.

"THE MAN OF IRON."

Never has a better talk been given than the Y. M. C. A. than that by Dr. Denison yesterday on "The Man of Iron." This was a fine allegory on how a habit that really ought to be a helpful servant often turns out a very tyrannical master. "A man," said Dr. Denison, "cannot afford to do twice what he would not be willing to do all his life. The tendency to form habits must not be fooled with. If a bad habit does get the best of a man religion offers help in two ways, by faith, which is a man's inward trust in God and by the outward association of ideas that will suggest the right line of action."

NOTABLE CHANGE IN TUG-OF-WAR CONTEST.

LONG PULL ABOLISHED.

Two Pulls of Shorter Duration Substituted.

November 6th has been set for the date of the next annual Field Day. The same events as usual will be contested between the classes of 1911 and 1912, namely the football game, the relay race and the tug-of-war. The points will count the same as before. Four points are counted for the football game, three for the relay race, and two for the tug-of-war.

On account of the way in which the tug-of-war has gone in previous years it has seemed that the main thing that determines which side is to win is what side gets the drop on the other. The side that gets in the first pull is almost sure to win. For this reason an important innovation is to be made.

Instead of the long pull of five minutes which used to take place after the two other contests were through, it has been decided by the advisory council to have a short pull as the starting event of the day, another of the same length between the halves of the football game. If these two result in a tie, another deciding pull will be held at the close of the football game.

This it is thought will give each side a fairer opportunity of winning and will eliminate as far as possible the element of chance that has been so evident in the contest in the past.
