cinders have been put on the track, and they are being worked in very carefully. The ground around the finish and start of the two twenty is being levelled. Some new and permanent standards are being put in for the pole vault and high jump. The Field House itself is being carefully renovated and improved.

On account of the lockers at the Field being broken into and injured during the winter, some new iron frame lockers are being put in. The water heating system is also being improved.

Just at present the main track work that is being done is that of the relay squad, or the bunch of men who are trying for the relay team will be sent to the Philadelphia games. Considerable headway has already been made and preliminary trials will be held very soon. It is likely that the make-up of the team will be slightly different from what it was this winter at the B. A. A. games.

PROF. TALBOT LECTURES IN BROOKLYN.

On Dissociation Theory and Applications to Analytical Chemistry.

Professor H. P. Talbot is giving a course of six lectures before the Brooklyn Institute of Arts and Science in the Brooklyn Polytechnic Institute, on the "Electrolytic Dissociation Theory and its Applications to Analytical Chemistry."

The lectures are primarily intended for teachers of chemistry in secondary schools, and for chemists who have not had opportunity for study of this subject.

The first three lectures deal with the experimental evidence on which the theory is based and with general laws; the fourth with specific cases of qualitative and quantitative analysis; and the final lecture, with the view of the opponents of the dissociation theory.

GRAD TO IMPROVE ROADS.

His appointment is in line with the tendency to employ technically educated men in the work of bettering the roads of the state.

DR. LOUGHLIN IN BUILDING STONES.

Also Teaches at Tufts. Aids Prof. Kemp.

Dr. Gerald F. Loughlin has assumed this year charge of the courses in third-year field-work and building stones and will co-operate with Professor James F. Kemp, the lecturer in economic geology from Columbia University, in the advanced courses in economic geology.

Dr. Loughlin is also, this year, giving a course in general geology at Tufts College in place of Professor J. S. Kingsley, who is on a year's leave of absence. Owing to increase of duties, he has resigned his position as compiler of foreign bibliography for economic geology to Mr. Charles H. Clapp.

GIFTS OF WOOL-GREASE BY-PRODUCTS.

Important Exhibits Shown in Dr. Gill's Laboratories.

An important addition for work in technical analysis has been made in the gift from Dr. Adolph Hess and Brothers of Leeds, England, through their agents in Boston, of an interesting collection of samples illustrating the products of distillation of wool grease.

The collection, while not very imposing, is very complete and gives a good idea of the stearines, oleines, hydrocarbons and pitches which can be prepared from this waste product.

The recovery of this waste has not been developed greatly in this country, and the contamination of inland waters by it have not received due attention. There is at present a bill before Massachusetts Legislature appropriating \$4000 for the investigating the pollution of the Merrimack River by these wool-scourings. This exhibit in Dr. Gill's laboratory is of timely interest to the state.

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
