SOPHOMORE BASEBALL VICTORY A SURPRISE.

CLOSE SCORE OF 6-7.

Crack Freshman Nine Goes Down to Defeat in Last Inning.

To the surprise of everyone the sophomore baseball team scored a victory over the crack freshman nine on Monday afternoon by the score of 7-6. The game was close from start to finish and up to the seventh inning looked like an easy victory for the freshman.

Both Horn and McLoughlin pitched steady ball until the freshman's fatal inning when 1910, by bunting four hits and getting a man on first by his being hit by a pitched ball, added four runs to their score of two, making the score 6-4.

Errors were responsible for a large part of the scoring, 1910 earning only three of their runs and 1911 but one. The freshman succeeded in getting a run in the eighth and again in the first half of the ninth inning, thus tying the score. Their rejoicing, however, did not last long for Cowee soon let Dillon in on a wild pitch.

The hitting in the game was not extra heavy and the stick work of the freshman was not up to their usual form. Even as it was, 1911 obtained eight hits to six for 1910.

Osborne at second played noticeably good ball for 1910 and McLoughlin excelled for the freshman.

The next game is expected to be close and interesting. If the freshman win a third game will be played to decide the championship. The summary:

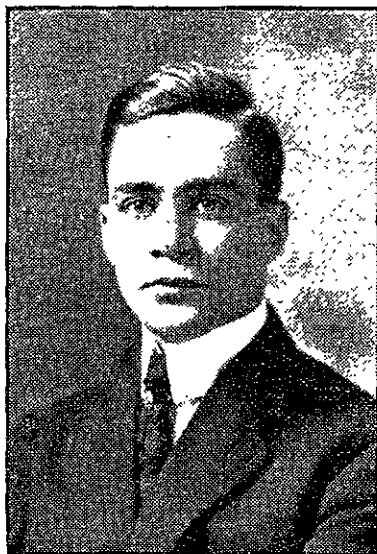
JOSLIN THE MAN.

New Head Has Been Long Connected With Tech Show.

Garnett Alfred Joslin 1909 has been appointed general manager of the 1909 Tech Show. The appointment was announced yesterday by Frederick A. Dewey, general manager of the 1908 Tech Show.

Joslin's appointment to the head position was expected by all connected with this year's show, his work having been of high character throughout his four year's connection with Institute theatricals. He started at the Institute with the class of 1903, playing the first two years on the class football team. Through changing his course he was set back one year.

of the chorus, and was appointed assistant-stage manager in his third year. Last year he was first assistant-stage manager and held the stage management throughout this year.

The other appointments will be made later in the year, those to the positions of advertising manager and stage manager coming very soon. The appointment of business manager will occur probably after the end of the school year.

ECONOMIC PRIZES OFFERED.

Intention to Arouse Interest in Business Problems.

In order to arouse an interest in the study of topics relating to commerce and industry and to stimulate those who have a college training to consider the problems of a business career, prizes have been offered by a big business concern for the best essays on economic subjects. The committee in charge of the competition and the giving of the prizes is composed of Prof. J. Laurence Laughlin, University of Chicago, chairman; Prof. J. B. Clark, Columbia University; Prof. Henry C. Adams, University of Michigan; Horace White, Esq., New York, and Hon. Carroll D. Wright, Clark College.

The prizes offered to those with academic training are first prize of \$600 and a second prize of \$400 for Class A, and a first prize of \$300 and a second prize of \$200 for Class B. Class A includes any American without restriction, but it is assumed that those entering have had an academic training, but the possession of a degree is not required of any contestant, nor is any age limit set. Class B includes only those, who, at the time the papers are sent in, are undergraduates of any American college. Any member of class B may compete in Class A.

CROSS COUNTRY TEAM OUT OF ANNUAL RACE.

INACTION THE REASON.

Management Failed to Send Any Representative to Association Meeting.

As things stand at present Technology will not be able to enter a team in the intercollegiate cross country run at Princeton next year. Notification to that effect has been received by the manager of the track team from the secretary of the Intercollegiate Association of Amateur Athletes of America.

The story goes back a good ways to the time of the meeting of the cross country association. There was some discussion previous to this as to whether the two associations should be merged and the distinction between track and cross country running should be abolished. The reason for this was the fact that all the colleges who were members of the big track association had amalgamated the managements of the two branches of track sport and had made the two coincident.

On Friday, March 13th, Raymond W. Ferris 1908, manager of the cross country team, received a letter from the secretary of the cross country association announcing a meeting on the following (Continued on page 2.)

ADVISORY BOARD OF THREE FOR N. E. I. A. A.

ENTRIES SENT IN.

List of Officials For Annual Meet Completely Made Out.

Three men to serve on an advisory committee for the New England Intercollegiate Athletic Association have been appointed by the president, H. W. Cowee, of Dartmouth. It is made up of graduates from three colleges which are members of the association.

The men appointed were, Morton D. Griswold, ex-captain Williams track team, to serve three years; D. Bradlee Rich, Dartmouth, two years, and M. T. Foster, Amherst, one year.

The motion offered by Technology, providing that on the Friday of the annual meet, on which day the preliminaries are run off, the 220-yard dash shall be run down to six men and the 220-yard hurdles to four men, was adopted unanimously. This will eliminate the necessity of running semi-final heats Saturday, and both races can be run off on the second day in one final heat.

The entries for the New England intercollegiate meet were due the end of last week on May 9. Each college is privileged to make six entries in every event.

The officials for the meet have all been secured. Harry Adams of Worcester will referee. He has held the position in the annual meet of the association for a great many years. B. B. Osthus will be clerk of course.

In order to take care of the great number of entries that are made for the meet, additional dressing rooms will have to be provided at Tech Field. To supply this need tents with carpets will be put up for the two days. The Dartmouth, Amherst, Brown and Technology teams will be housed in the regular field dressing rooms, but the smaller teams will be taken care of in the temporary quarters.

DISCUS UNDER WEIGHT.

Record Made by Nisbet Last Saturday Not Allowed.

Owing to the fact that the discus used in Brown meet last Saturday was five ounces under weight the record made by Nisbet 1909 will not be allowed. Major Frank H. Briggs, chairman of the advisory council on athletics, weighed the missile Saturday night and found this to be the case.

MANY CHANGES MADE FOR GRADUATION PLANS.

NO ALUMNI RECEPTION.

1908 Class to Get Great Welcome at Pops Concert.

At the recent meeting of the Association of Class Secretaries plans were perfected for the commencement celebration in June.

For years the alumni have tendered a reception to the graduating class on the Friday evening prior to commencement. Before the advent of the Pop Concert this was the only social affair, aside from the annual dinner, which gave new and old graduates an opportunity to mingle.

But the constantly increasing size of the graduating class has multiplied the difficulties in the way of making a reception successful. This year it will be abandoned altogether, and as a substitute certain new features will be introduced at the Pop Concert.

There the graduating class, nearly three hundred strong, will march in all together after the hall is filled, will be presented with the 1908 banner, cheered and showered with confetti. The class will cheer in return, and then all will join in singing the first number on the programme, which will probably be "Dear Old M. I. T." Another feature of the concert will be the introduction of more singing and the restriction of cheering to the intervals between numbers on the programme.

Another change will be made in connection with the class spreads. These have generally been held in the late afternoon, but too early for the convenience of business men. This year they will fill the time between 5.30 and 7.45 P. M. on Tuesday, June 9, the evening of the Pop Concert.

A general spread or buffet supper will be served in the banquet hall at the Brunswick, while the different classes will maintain headquarters with lighter refreshments in individual rooms. It is anticipated that this will eventually become one of the strong features of the celebration, for it will give the best possible opportunity for the alumni to meet each other in a free and easy way, and to pass the time between close of business and the opening of the Pop Concert.
