5. Is it to be expected that the present and recent production of gold will cause a higher level of prices?

wicked to the concert, and there enter individually with their banners, as has been the custom in past years.
At the same meeting of the class secretaries proposed changes in the constitution of the Alumni Association were discussed. The business of the latter organization has in the past been transacted by a relatively small group of men who have hurriedly gone through it just prior to the annual dinner. It is now proposed to place the general control of the affairs of the association in the hands of a council to be made up as follows:
1. An executive committee of eight elected at large, as at present.
2. The secretaries of all graduate

classes or such other representatives of those classes.

3. The secretaries of all local alumni associations, or such other representatives as may be elected.

4. The fifteen term members of the corporation of the Institute, who are elected by the corporation from a list of candidates selected by vote of the Alumni Association.

This plan is still in the hands of a committee and no final action will be taken for some months, but it is evident that such an organization would be most representative in its character. The new plan would lead to the dissolution of the Association of Class Secretaries, but would give each individual an office of real power in the council. It would naturally result in the publication of the Technology Review as the organ of the Alumni Association. At present it is published by the Association of Class Secretaries.

Plans have been perfected under which a permanent paid editor has been secured who will maintain an office in connection with the headquarters of the Alumni Association in the Rogers Building, and who will also serve the Institute directly in matters of publicity regarding its work. This position will be held by Isaac W. Littlefield 1885.
