Barnes takes the ball through for five yards. 1912 punts to the 45-yard line from the 14-yard line. 1913 is penalized 15 yards for holding. Murdock replaced by Capen. 1913's ball. Eichorn makes nine yards in two consecutive plays. Time called for Robertson. Eichorn makes five yards. Fallon makes eight. Delayed pass by 1913 fails. Wilfert replaced by Whitman. Goff makes one yard. Duffy replaces Fallon. Smythe-Martin replacing Gans. 1913 fumbles, but recover the ball and are penalized five yards for holding. Goff takes ball. Time called with final score 3-0.

RELAY RACE.

Winning the relay race saved the sophomore class from a shut out yesterday afternoon. Directly after the first half of the football game, the relay men came out on the track. The toss was won by 1912 and they took the pole. Walker running first for the sophomores, and Trull for the freshmen. With the starter's pistol Walker, by a fine sprint, took the lead and held the pole about two yards ahead of Trull. The freshman regained this lead and they finished even, Walker passing to Morgan, 1912 and Trull giving the flag to Welch. The passes were both well made, but Morgan got the pole and gained three yards. Welch relayed to Brewster, 1913, who ran a very good 220, gaining a yard from Fox, who was running for 1912. The latter made a very poor pass to Dube, 1912 and the sophomores lost the lead, Cairns, 1913 finishing with an advantage of three yards. Thompson for 1913, was out-run by Shephard, 1912, and the freshmen lead was reduced to a yard. Byland 1913, took the flag from Thompson and Gere, 1912, gained two yards, but made a poor pass to Seelye, 1912, who ran against Peck, 1913. Peck was slightly ahead of Seelye and relayed to Haynes, 1913. Allen took the flag from Seelye and gained three yards on Hayes giving the sophomores the lead. Hamilton, 1913, now took the flag for the freshmen, running against Greenleaf, who reduced the sophomore's lead to two yards. Greenleaf relayed to Murray, 1912, who was passed on the curve by Burnham, the freshman team's captain, but Murray, on the stretch, gained on Burnham and they finished on even terms. Murray passed to Reed, 1912, who an a fine race against Mattson, 1913. Reed gained six yards on his opponent and made a good pass to the final man, Oettinger, 1912. He increased the sophomore lead to 25 yards, completely outclassing Conant, 1913, his opponent. The time was 5 minutes 4 2-5 seconds.

TUG-OF-WAR.

Field Day was decided yesterday by the tug-of-war. Three pulls were re-

quired. The freshmen team won the first, the sophomores won the second and the third pull, after being practically won by the sophomores went to the freshmen.

It was a case of the best all-around team winning. The sophomores slightly outweighed the 1913 team, but the endurance of the freshmen was by far the greater; this quality, in addition to the systematic pulling gave the freshmen an advantage which the 1912 team could not overcome.

The tug-of-war contest was the first event. The men filed on the field about 2:14; the 1913 team taking the north end of the field. The gun sounded and the freshmen got back on the rope first, slowly increasing their lead. They were never in any danger of being pulled back and, at the end of one minute fifteen seconds the 1913 team had pulled 1912 twice as far as the winning mark. This was owing to miss fire of the gun at the exact time of the finish.

After the relay race the teams lined-up again now on opposite sides of the centre flag. Both teams got the drop simultaneously, and for a few seconds the ribbon moved to and fro, sometimes toward the sophomores flag, then toward the freshmen pole. After about 45 seconds, the 1912 team gained ground and at the end of one minute twenty-four seconds, the sophomore team had won the second pull, thus tying the event.

It was up to the tug-of-war teams to win the day. The teams grasped the rope firmly, each determined to pull his hardest, and at the report of the gun, their features set and their heels dug deeply into the turf. The freshmen gradually drew the marker toward them, but they couldn't keep it up, the sophomores slowly won back their lost position of the rope and steadily began to pull the 1913 team toward them. The 1912 men rushed on to the field, loudly cheering their team; the spectators crowded around the contestants, all fully expecting to see the 1912 team win. Steadily the ribbon crept toward 1912 until only a few inches more would decide the battle: then the freshmen braced and for a moment neither side seemed to gain, but now the constant practice and endurance told; the freshmen, clinching their teeth, desperately threw every ounce of their strength into the work, and the sophomores followed them, first slowly, then faster and faster, past the center mark and on to defeat. In exactly two minutes forty-four seconds, the 1913 team had shown their superiority in the event. The following 1913 men will get their numbers:—

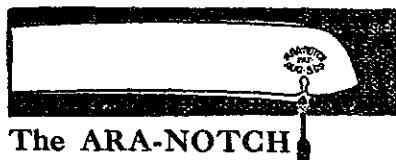

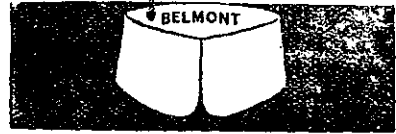
