

CONVOCAATION

Dr. George A. Gordon, pastor of the New Old South Church, will address the student body today at the first convocation of the year.

As in the case of all general convocations, this one will be held in Huntington Hall at 2 P. M. sharp. All two o'clock exercises will be postponed till 2.30.

Dr. Gordon's theme is not known, but in as much as today is the day before Thanksgiving, he will probably speak upon some subject relating to that day.

Dr. MacLaurin desires a full attendance, and in as much as it is the first convocation under his administration, it is expected that the entire student body will turn out.

DEFICIT VERY SMALL

"Concerning the Massachusetts Institute of Technology" has proved so decidedly desirable and valuable that the deficit, which at one time was feared would grow large, has been greatly reduced.

Five thousand copies of this work were originally issued. This edition is expected to last for three years. Up to the present day over fifteen hundred have been distributed. At the beginning of the present college year everyone in the Institute was supposed to receive a copy free of charge. Through some mistake, a few of the men of the entering class did not receive one. As soon as this was learned by the committee in charge it was decided to again give every man in the Institute a chance to obtain a copy. So these books were distributed in the various rooms during classes, and now it is believed that nearly everyone has one.

The price of the book was one dollar

to all the alumni, and from now on it will be fifty cents to all undergraduates. Many copies have been sold to graduates, and from this money the deficit has been reduced to ten dollars.

The committee, of which Gorton James is chairman, has decided in a short time to turn all the copies over to the Institute, to do with as they think best. However, they wish to announce that if any one knows of any school to which it might prove profitable to send one or more copies, the committee will be only too glad to get word of it.

GLIDER TO BE BUILT

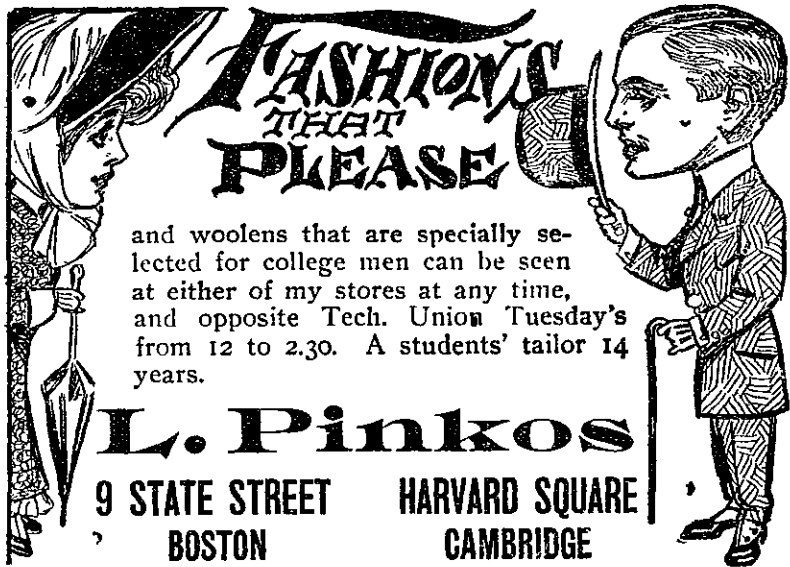
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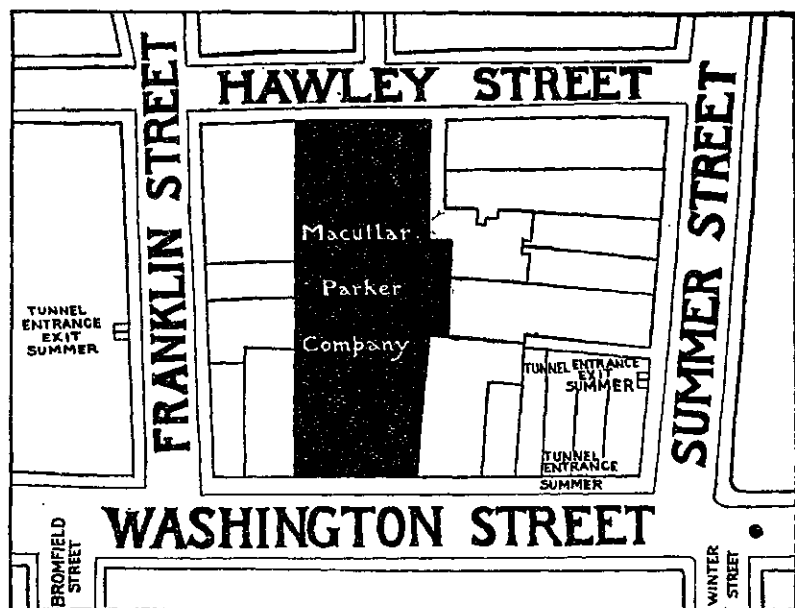


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
