

ALUMNI HOLD DINNER**Class Of 1903 Hear Bursar
Rand On Progress Of Tech**

After an excellent dinner in the Union, about twelve members of the class of 1903 gathered around Bursar Rand to hear about the Institute and the many changes which have been brought about. In a most informal manner the Bursar spoke of the Union and the recent growth in social life. He touched next on the work of the Institute Committee and the Point System.

The Bursar was especially enthusiastic in his praise of the alumni, he said in part, "There isn't a college in the world that receives as much support from the alumni as the Institute. The alumni never were so loyal. We are going to move just as soon as we can. The Faculty was never so decided and a systematic campaign will be made to provide funds." He then took up the new athletic system and freshman drill.

The alumni present, expressed great satisfaction with the dinner, both with the food and the service, which they say is superior to that which they received in hotels last winter. This is their first dinner this year but plans are on foot for another in the near future. Last year this class held four or five dinners, with an average attendance of 25 to 30.

GENERAL NOTICES.**FIRST YEAR.****Entrance Condition Examinations.**

First-year students are expected to take at the end of the present term all entrance examinations in which they have not already clear records, with the following exceptions:

1. Students having conditions in entrance History and entrance Physics. No examination will be held in entrance History and entrance Physics at the semi-annual examination period.
2. Special students taking no work dependent on entrance subjects in which they have not clear records. Such students, if they desire to become regular, may take remaining examinations in June or September.
3. Students who are now making up entrance French and German by taking the elementary courses, although they are privileged to take these examinations.
4. Students entitled to excuse from particular entrance conditions on the

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basis of good term work. This applies to conditions in entrance Algebra, English, French, German, and Plane Geometry and students will be notified if excuse can be given.
