PLANS COMPLETED FOR MUSICAL CLUBS' TRIP

GYM TEAM PROGRESS

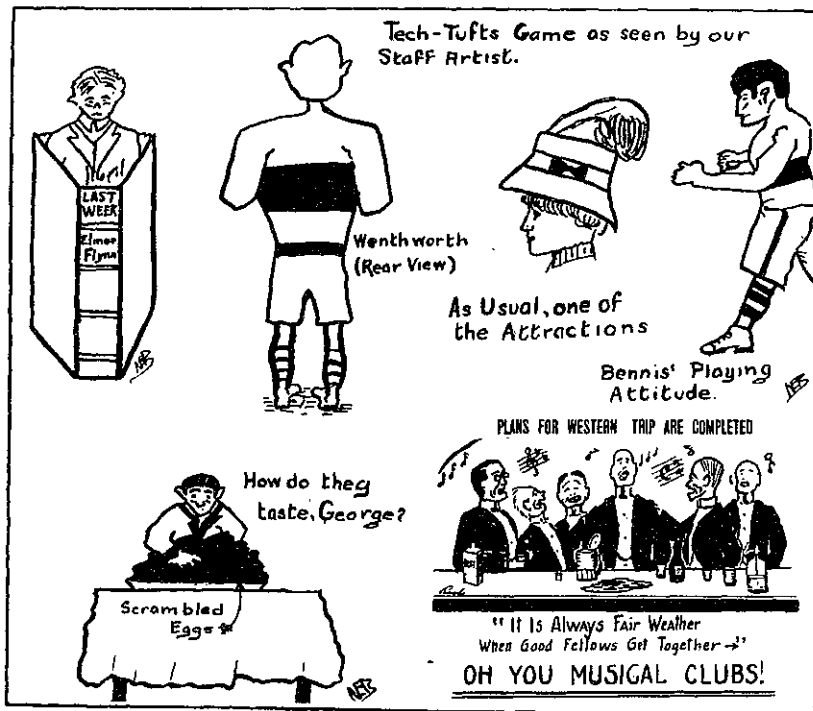
Boxing And Wrestling Will Be New Features This Year

Technology will be represented by a Gym team next term. Prior to the novice meet which was held on December 21, there was some doubt whether the Institute could produce a team this year which would fittingly represent it in contests with other colleges; but since then, Manager Jacoby has written to several teams in regard to arranging meets, and several of these have replied favorably. He expects to arrange a contest every week during February and March, starting on Saturday after mid-year when the team will face the Salem Y. M. C. A. After this, it will probably meet Amherst, Williams, and the College of the City of New York, although the dates have not as yet been decided.

An innovation this year will be the introduction of boxing and wrestling. H. D. Billings 1910, A. C. Herreschoff 1912, and R. Smythe-Martin 1913 will probably represent the Institute in these sports.

STANTON H. KING TO SPEAK TO T. C. A.

Will Tell Of The Work Of The Sailor's Haven At Six To- morrow Night

Stanton H. King is coming to the Union on Wednesday evening as speaker at the fifth Christian Association dinner. It is the consistent purpose to secure men to speak at these weekly meetings, who can talk interestingly and authoritatively. The list following witnesses to the success of this purpose to date.

On December 1st Mac H. W. Stebbins, chaplain of Charlestown Prison, next A. R. Williams of Maverick Church; the following week J. Frank Chase of the Water & Ward Society, and last week John Hopkins Denison of Central Church. And to-morrow night

Mr. King is going to relate the story of the sailor, and the work which is being done by the Sailors' Home amongst the shipping and in the port.

At the age of fourteen Mr. King first took berth as a sailor before the mast. At the advice of friends, however, he left the sea to get an education, but not before he had served a full term in the United States Navy. He learned, before this term expired, the true life of the sailor, and at the end of his schooling, when he had graduated from Mt. Hermon School at Northfield, Mass., he accepted the position of assistant to the Superintendent of the Sailors' Haven, whom he has succeeded. That was fifteen years ago. He is still at it, and no man knows better than he the situation among sea-faring men.

The Wednesday evening dinners have superseded the meetings which used to be held on Sunday evening, and are filling the purpose of those meetings better than ever before. They get together weekly the men interested in Christian work, they are instructive, they are full of sociability, and are practical. A cordial invitation is always given to anyone who may wish to come. It is not a close corporation. The dinners are held every Wednesday at 6.00 P. M., except when announced otherwise, and always cost twenty cents.

TECHNOLOGY AND DARTMOUTH BASKET-BALL

Game Scheduled For Tuesday At Hanover---Teams Evenly Matched

Capt. Parker and his band of basketball warriors will invade Hanover today to try conclusions with the Dartmouth team. With the Tech men in the pink of condition, it should prove a warm contest. Although it will be the first game for the New Hampshire men they will doubtless present a strong team. With the exception of Lang, practically all of last year's squad has returned. Lang was elected captain at the close of last season, but did not have the necessary time for training this year; and so has been elected coach of the team. Under his coaching the Green and White are assured a successful season.

Tech is not so fortunate in having a team of veterans this year. Wentworth's ineligibility after having trained regularly with the team came as a surprise to the students and a shock to the team. However, the team is playing together remarkably well, as was shown by the fact that in the Lowell Textile game three men were tied for first honors in scoring baskets from the floor. Capt. Parker, Hargraves and Johnson each scoring five times, and Bennis and Darling scoring three each. The passing of the home team at times completely bewildered the visitors, and the Dartmouth team will certainly have difficulty in breaking it up.

The line-up for Tech will probably be: Hargraves and Johnson, forwards; Parker, center; Bennis and Crocker, backs; with Ells and Darling as substitutes.

INDOOR TRACK MEET COMES TOMORROW

Large Number Of Freshmen Entered---Will Show Up Strong

The annual Inter-Class Indoor Track Meet comes Wednesday night, and the entries close tonight, Jan. 11. The outcome is in doubt, but the fight will probably be fiercest between the two lower classes, with the odds rather in favor of the freshmen, who have shown up very strong this year and have come out in large numbers, many having chosen track instead of gym work. In fact, 1913 has sent a large squad that Coach Kanaly has decided to have a Freshman track team this year, and will arrange meets with several high schools and other freshmen teams. This meet will also help give a line on the make-up of the Relay team, the preliminary trials of which come this Saturday, while the final trials are on Jan. 22.

New men are out for every event and several of these have good prospects of winning places in this meet. This is particularly true of the shot put which will probably be won by a new man, H. S. Gott 1910 and E. Stuart 1910 are the only men entered at this time. The high jump, which was won last year by E. Stuart 1910, with a jump of 5 ft. 6 1-2 inches, lies between him and P. W. Dabrymple 1912, who came second last year. The third place is in some doubt.

W. D. Allen 1911 is expected to raise the Institute record of 11 ft. one inch, for the pole vault which he made at the Fall Handicap Meet in 1908. E. Mangan 1912 is also out and will probably make a good try at second place, as he has shown up especially well of late. Other entries in this event are H. S. Gott 1910, and W. C. Salisbury 1911.

As usual, there is a large entry in the 35-yd. dash. R. B. McEwen, a new man, is picked to win this race, by some with A. J. Moreom 1913, J. Becker, Jr. 1912, J. S. Grant 1912, or S. E. Reed 1912, following close. However, this event is always doubtful and a dark horse often breaks the tape. For the first time in years there will be a full entry in the 40-yd. high hurdles, and this should prove an interesting fight between W. J. Pead, Jr. 1910, R. B. McEwen, and C. A. Read, Jr. 1913.

In the mile run, the entries are R. M. Ferry 1912, R. D. Bonney 1913, H. D. Peck 1913.

R. M. Ferry 1912, J. I. Taylor 1912, M. A. Oettinger 1912, R. D. Sampson 1913, R. D. Bonney 1913, and W. S. Davis 1910 are entered for the half, and should give a good exhibition. Some of these men may not run, in view of the fact that the Relay trials come so soon after.

In the B. A. A. meet which comes on the twenty-second of next month, Tech will probably run against Dartmouth according to a report given to the papers. This is not definitely known at this time, but it is certain that the Institute team will race a good team, since its past performances have placed it in a high class.
