both of which had to be cared for while building the viaducts. To do this the outer thirds were constructed first, allowing use of the middle third for traffic, after which these were thrown open and the middle third built. One photograph was particularly interesting, showing the steel work, concrete, and paving of the viaduct being carried on feet of each other. The amount of streets thus bridged comprised eight acres and very heavy construction was necessary in all cases. The weight of steel work alone on the Ninth Avenue Viaduct aggregated 3520 tons.

The station building is quite a masterpiece from an architectural point of view, with its granite pillars and lunette windows, differing widely from the ordinary design of a station. The magnitude of the work is shown by the fact that 13,000 shop drawings were required for the steel and other work. The most striking part of the structure from both outside and in, as the main waiting room. This is three hundred feet long by one hundred wide, and nearly one hundred and fifty feet in height, standing far above the other portions of the building. This fact necessitated special designs of reinforcement to stand the wind pressure. Besides this main waiting room there are two others, each equal in size to that of the Grand Central Station.

The lecture was well illustrated with a large number of lantern slides, and after the able description by Mr. O'Brien it was easily understood by those present why this is the greatest terminal in the world.

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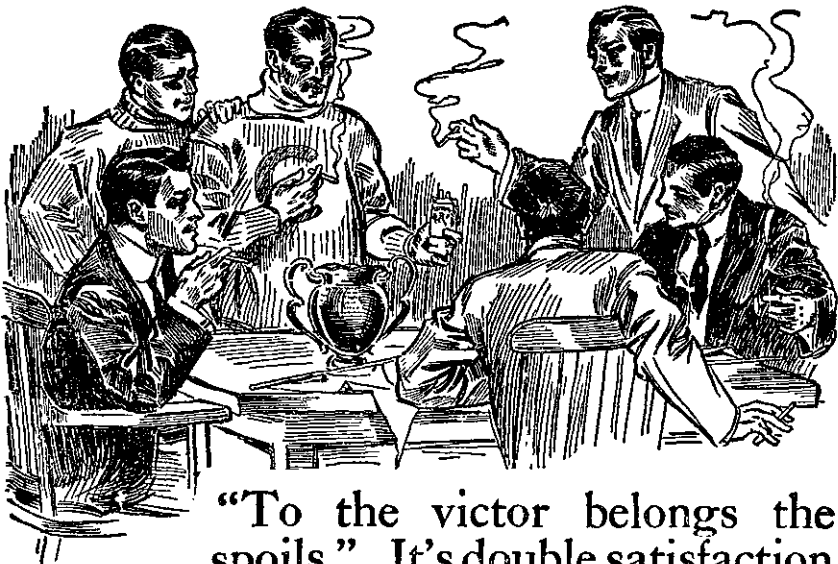
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
