INTERCOURSE CROSS-COUNTRY ON SATURDAY

Different Division Than Last Year---Course II Runs Alone

The courses are separated differently this year for the Intercourse Cross Country race which comes tomorrow. There are three teams this year. Courses I, VI, XIII, and XIV will run together, Course II makes up another team and all other courses run as the third. This arrangement was considered the most desirable because there are so many fast men in Courses II and VI and although these courses have formerly been on the same team, they would have an overwhelming advantage this year. As usual the first six men of each team to finish will count—that is, if all the teams enter that number of men which seems at present a little doubtful.

The race is over the Harvard course and since the competitors leave on the 2.22 train from Back Bay station, it is expected that the last man will have reached the Field soon after three o'clock.

A number of men ran over the course Monday and they report it to be in a better condition than it has ever been at this time of the year. There were no wet spots and if the weather man is kindly disposed the run will be held under ideal conditions.

This race is primarily for freshmen and help give them experience in running over the course. The sophomores should take enough interest to send out a large squad in preparation for the Freshman-Sophomore race next week.

To those who are not quite familiar with the course, it may be of value to describe it briefly. The start is in front of the Highland Club on Bellevue Ave., in Highland. Thence down Bellevue Ave. for 200 yards when a turn is made into a field and up hill into an orchard. The course leads downhill through this orchard and across a road with a stone wall on either side into a meadow. It crosses this meadow going over another stone wall into woods and then downhill to a brook which marks the first mile.

The next mile is through woods and meadow with six fences—two wire and four stone—ending at the pig pens. A quarter mile beyond is the famous Larz Anderson hill which has proved the undoing of many a hopeful runner. From here the course is all on macadam and is downhill most of the way past Jamaica Pond to the Field and ending with a single lap around the track.

A hard fight for low score is expected between the Course I-VI team and the Course II aggregation. Watkins will probably head the field for the former and Cartwright and R. M. Ferry will be up front for the latter. The remaining courses may spring a surprise and come second but this would be surprising considering past performances.

Purdue University has taken up a new activity. Last week the university was represented by a rifle team of ten men at the meet of the Intercollegiate Indoor Rifle association and a good showing was made. Capt. Watkins, who is leading the team, has a sharpshooters medal, which he won in army service.

BELL, GOULD AND TERRY SENIOR MARSHALS

Men Elected To Positions Have Been Active In Class Affairs

The election of the Senior Class Day Marshalls showed plainly that the class felt little hesitation in their choice. The three men elected netted very nearly the same number of votes apiece, while their lowest man led his next competitor by twelve votes. Of the eighty-six ballots cast, Frank Frederick Bell of Bristol, Pa., received thirty-four, Allen Adams Gould of Newton Upper Falls received thirty-three, and Philip Dunbar Teny of Waterville, N. Y. received twenty-eight. Of the men who were not elected but who netted more than ten votes, Karl Dickson Fernstrom received sixteen, John Avery, Jr., and Bergen Reynolds fourteen, Philip Weeks Burnham and Herbert Squires Cleverdon twelve, and Merrill William Tilden eleven. The committee in charge of the election included the following men: F. F. Bell, J. Avery, Jr., E. Stuart, F. A. Hurley, and H. S. Cleverdon.

During his years as an underclassman, Bell played on the class football team and was a member of the Technique Electoral Committee. During his junior year, he was treasurer of 1910 Technique and class representative to the Athletic Association. He is now class representative to the Institute Committee and a member of the Class Day Committee.

For the past three years, Gould has played upon the hockey team. He ran upon his class relay and was a member of the Technique Electoral Committee. Last year he was a member of the Junior Prom Committee and treasurer of the class. This year he is class Vice-President. He was recently elected to the Class Day Committee.

Teny has been a member of the class football team, secretary and president of the New York State Club and member of the Institute Committee. Last year he was elected vice-president of the class and was Associate-Editor of 1910 Technique, assuming the duties of chairman when the Editor-in-Chief withdrew from the Institute. He is a member of the Class Day Committee.

PROFESSOR VOSE DIES

Was Formerly Head Of Civil Engineering Department

Professor George L. Vose, who was Hayward Professor of Civil and Topographical Engineering at the Institute between the years 1881-1886, died on March 29 in Brunswick, Maine. The funeral services are to be held today in the Bowdoin College Chapel at 9.30 A. M. The burial will be at Salem.

After graduating from college, he was employed by various railroads in the United States and Canada until 1860, when he became associate editor of the American Railway Times, published in Boston. After four years in that position he practised engineering for himself. Since leaving our Institute in 1886, he has lived in a retired way at Salem, Concord, Paris, Me., and in Brunswick. He was a well-known author, and wrote treatises on engineering subjects which have been used as text-books. His best known book is a manual for railway engineers and engineering students.

CREW CANDIDATES REPORT AT BOAT HOUSE

Dr. Cabot And Coach O'Leary Emphasized Training And Practice

Dr. Cabot, president of the Union Boat Club, and Mr. O'Leary, who has been engaged to coach the crew, addressed the varsity crew candidates Wednesday afternoon at the Union Boat Club.

Dr. Cabot in his talk, emphasized the necessity of regular attendance at practice and the fact that the crew practice should be looked upon not as work, but as a sport; also, that the men with brute strength are not usually the men who make a crew, but rather those men of medium weight, who have endurance and willingness to work hard. The principal aim of the crew is to work together and to act as a unit.

Coach O'Leary said that the man who has rowed before is not always the best man on a crew; he is going to judge the men not by their previous experience but by what they will do in the shell. He expects to have two crews and at first will coach one crew from the coxswain's seat of the other and later he will coach both crews from a single shell. The men will be put to work immediately and they will be notified through The Tech when they are to report for practice.

O'Leary wished to impress on the candidates that there is no necessity for being a swimmer, as the shell will be perfectly stable and safe.
