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TECH'S OUTLOOK FOR N. E. INTERCOLLEGIATES

Probable Point Winners Have Been Picked By Coach Kanaly

On Friday and Saturday, May 20th and 21st, the 24th annual track meet of the New England Intercollegiate Athletic Association will be held at Tech Field, Brookline. Twelve colleges enter teams in this meet and all of them send the very best men they have on the track and field.

Last year Dartmouth took first place with 32 1-2 points; Technology coming in second with 27. Williams and Bowdoin both scored over 20 points, and Amherst, Brown, Wesleyan, Maine, Tufts, and Vermont divided the other points in the order named. Dartmouth is again picked for first this year, but they will be pushed closely by Tech, Amherst, and Williams. Wesleyan finished seventh last year, but this year they are considerably stronger and are expected to be a strong factor.

To show how Technology stands in regard to this year's meet, Coach Kanaly gives this dope as to the outcome of the meet. This is based on the performances in last year's intercollegiates and the work of the men—both new and experienced—during the winter. So many star men are entered this year that several records will probably go this spring.

In the 100-yards dash, Sherman of Dartmouth is looked upon as a sure winner, with Robson of Wesleyan second. Robson secured second in this event last year. Roberts of Amherst or Kelly of Williams will take third. Roberts was not entered last year, but has showed up well this winter, being the lowest mark man to place in the 60-yard dash at the Columbia University games; and is even considered as a likely man for second place. Kelly took third in this event last year. Pinkett of Amherst was fourth last year and will be a factor again. He ran well this winter at the Columbia games. Hartigan is hailed by Brown as their fastest man. He was reported as fast last year but was injured just before the intercollegiate meet.

Sherman is again picked to win the 220-yard dash. Kelly (Amherst), who took second place last year and Alexander of Williams, who came in fourth, will surely place. Roberts of Amherst is an unknown quantity, but he looks likely for a place. Robson if in form will push Sherman hard and is the logical man for second place.

Bacon of Wesleyan, who won the 440-yard dash, is back again this year, and will probably repeat his win. Swartz of Tufts ran second last year and is again running well and expected to improve. In 1906 he ran the fastest heat of the meet, and being an experience man will certainly bear watching. Salisbury (Tech) secured third last year and should be able to better that position. Littlefield of Maine showed improvement in the B. A. A. games and will crowd competition for a place. He was fourth man last year. Wendall, Wood, and Hastings, all Wesleyan men, are worthy of notice in picking the places, as all of them showed up in fine form at the Columbia games. Francis of Dartmouth is a dangerous man. He broke down in the finals of the 600-yard novice race at the Columbia games, after running his preliminary heat handily, but should be better in the 440. Schlee of Wesleyan, who won the 600-yard at Columbia, undoubtedly will bear watching, and Hall of Dartmouth is also talked of as a crack distance man, having brought a reputation with him from Michigan.

DO ACTIVITIES NEED A FINANCE COMMISSION?

Representatives Meet To De- cide Existence And Powers Of New Body

This afternoon will be made the third attempt to summons the representatives from the various activities to a joint meeting with the Institute Committee to consider the question of appointing a committee of graduate men to advise the activities on finance matters, and to so arrange affairs that they will not get beyond their depth.

The meeting will be held at 4.15 in room A of the Union. At the last meeting held it was decided that some sort of a committee should be formed, but the great difficulty and bone of contention between the representatives of the various organizations was what powers the committee should have. All were agreed that some sort of definite duties should be given but no one was exactly decided as to how far it would be advisable to let responsibility be taken off from the shoulders of the members of the activities.

Since the committee met articles have been drawn up specifying powers and these will be submitted this afternoon.

In the 880-yard run, White (Tech) and Fortier (Maine), who took first and second last year, are again running, but if the prediction of the dopesters in the New York papers is true, Barloe of Dartmouth will push them for first place. Lester of Williams, who was third last year, is back and is a strong factor. Last year he won the fastest preliminary heat and he should be capable of repeating his work this year. Dartmouth is expected to have a good man under cover for this event, and from the number of places their men have been taking in New York City and State meets, are to be considered as probable to take a place.

In the mile, Colbath of Bowdoin is consistent and should give his college first place again this year. Watkins (M. I. T.) looks good for second place and if able to devote more time to his training should push Colbath dangerously. A new comer is Newton of Williams, who showed rare form this winter and must be kept in view. He ran second in the mile at the B. A. A. games. Spokefield and Noyes, both of Dartmouth, have improved and at a recent New York 1500-meter run showed speed by winning over a good field. Jones of Dartmouth is fast as is shown by his running second in the N. Y. A. C. mile from 60 yards, in 4 min. 25 sec.

Howland's loss to Tech in the two-mile leaves a gap hard to fill, and with Slocum of Bowdoin still in the game, it looks like first place for Bowdoin. Slocum's form two years ago stamped him as a first place prediction. Greene (Brown) pushed Howland to the tape last year and is a strong game runner who will take lots of beating. Colbath and Watkins should hardly have placed last year after such a race in the mile, and will probably be defeated this year. Dartmouth has some men who showed up well in the cross-country championships, and as they will start fresh against men who have already raced a mile, will probably take the second and third places.

The 120-yard hurdles offer the best chance for new first and second place winners. Edwards of Bowdoin, Marble of Brown, and Smith of Maine are a trio of former third and fourth place winners and will probably push to the front. Edwards ran second in the fastest heat

DEAN BURTON SPEAKS AT T. C. A. DINNER

Calls J. P. Munroe 1882, Type Of Man Best Fitted To Act As Leader Of Men

Last evening the T. C. A. held its weekly dinner in the Union. There were not quite as many there as usual, but all enjoyed a thoroughly good talk. Dean Burton was the speaker, and he took for his subject, "What the New Christian Association Can Do for Technology Life." Mr. Mason announced the speaker for next week as Mr. James D. Munroe, 1882, and then introduced the Dean. Dean Burton said that Mr. Munroe was a very good example for any T. C. A. member to follow, and that he fully illustrated his subject. He said that Mr. Munroe had done very much for the Institute. When the Technology Club was just being started, Mr. Munroe became interested and made it what it now is. He obtained speakers to address the club, such as F. Marion Crawford, who could hardly be expected to be in sympathy with a technical life. In fact Mr. Munroe had many men for speakers who spoke before various literary clubs around here.

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last year. Dartmouth again looks strong in this event as they have some experienced men to follow into the places of last year's placed men.

Edwards is the probable winner of the 220-yard hurdles. Marble (Brown) and Stevens (Williams) took places in their heats last year and will fight for second place again. There is a good chance for new men to take the other places in this event.

The high jump is practically assured to Palmer of Dartmouth. Dalrymple (M. I. T.) looks likely for second place, but in Burlingame of Bowdoin he will have to look for trouble as when in shape Burlingame is good for at least five feet and ten inches. McKay of Brown and Swain of Williams were only three-fourths of an inch behind last year and will need attention in figuring this year's places. Capt. Allen of Tech, who tied for fourth last year, will have to improve considerably to repeat his performance this year, as sickness has prevented his attending to his specialty this winter.

Sherman (Dartmouth) should win the broad jump, and Nash (Amherst) and Guthrie (Vermont) should follow on merit of last year, but sprinters from Amherst, Dartmouth, Wesleyan, and Williams may develop into dangerous contestants in this event. This event is dangerous at best, as is shown by Sherman's injury last year, which necessitated his withdrawing from a sure win in the 100-yard and 200-yard dashes. Many colleges do not care to risk their sprinters in the broad jump.

The pole vault is conceded to Holdman of Dartmouth, because of his win last year, but Allen of Technology is always a game and steady performer, and he should again take second and possibly reach Holdman. There is no good chance to dope this event on account of the lack of indoor competition, but the last two places will probably be fought between Jenks of Dartmouth and Demming of Brown. This event also offers a good chance for new comers.

There is likely to be a new winner of the shot-put in Frank of Brown. However, Killian of Amherst and his teammate Kooyunjan have improved considerably, and this means that any new winner must reach forty-one feet at
