UNDER-CLASS TRACK MEET WON BY SOPHS

Overwhelm 1913 By 77 To 39, Taking Majority of Points In Field Events

With J. S. Grant, their star point winner, the Sophomores easily won Saturday's underclass track meet by the score of 77 to 39. Grant won both hurdle races and took second in the 100-yard dash. The surprises of the meet were the running of M. A. Oettinger 1912, who carried off first in the 440, and second in both the 100 and 200 yard dashes, and the winning of the 220 by J. J. Strachan 1913. H. Watkins 1912, carried off first in the 880 and the mile run. H. Greenleaf also of 1912, took first in the broad jump and the pole vault.

In the weight events, the Sophomores took all but a third in the hammer throw and a second in the discus throw, these places being caused by N. D. MacLeod 1913, J. L. Bray 1912, throw, these places being captured by and W. M. Ruby 1912 were the best men in these events. The summary:

One Of Tech's Most Active Alumni To Discuss "Civiliza- tion Engineer"

On Wednesday, April 13, the Technology Christian Association will hold the last of the weekly dinners preceding the annual meeting of the Association. James P. Monroe 1882, a graduate of Course III, is to be the speaker of the evening. Mr. Monroe has done a great deal for Technology. He served as Secretary of the corporation, was a founder of the Technology Club, was a leading spirit of the Technology Review, and was active in uniting the alumni in order to prevent the absorption of the Institute by Harvard University. He is also chairman of the Boston 1915 movement. The subject of Mr. Monroe's talk will be "The Civilization Engineer."

The dinner will be held at the Union at 6.00 P. M., at the usual price of twenty cents. All who intend to be present should leave their names at the Cage not later than Wednesday noon.

SOPHOMORES WIN CROSS-COUNTRY RACE

E. E. Ferry Leads Over Entire Course—First Four Men To Finish Are Sophs

The sophomores captured the first four places in the annual Freshman-Sophomore Cross-Country race Saturday, and won easily by the score of 28 to 51. E. E. Ferry 1912 came first, covering the four and one-half miles in 25 minutes 20 3-5 seconds, with his brother R. M. Ferry 1912, a half minute behind. The time was not particularly fast; in fact it was rather slow since at no time in the entire race was first place doubtful. Capt. Watkins' time last year on the course was 24 minutes and 33 seconds, while Ferry only secured sixth place after running the course in 25 minutes, nine seconds.

At the start in Highland E. E. Ferry and H. S. Benson 1912, sprang to the lead, followed by K. Cartwright 1912, R. M. Ferry 1912, and V. V. Ballard 1912. This order continued for two miles and a half as far as Larz Anderson hill. At this point Cartwright and R. M. Ferry pulled away from Ballard with whom they had been running, and passed Benson. At Jamaica Pond, a mile from the finish, Cartwright dropped behind R. M. Ferry. This order was kept to the finish.

The first freshman to finish, C. W. Brett, was over two minutes behind the winner. G. R. Pardey 1913, who showed great promise in the practice run Tuesday, proved a disappointment, finishing thirteenth. E. L. Macdonald 1913, pushed R. Whipple 1912, hard for seventh position and gained rapidly on the lap around the track, but was unable to pass him before the finish.

The first six men to finish will receive their numerals, and the numerals 1912 will again be engraved on the Cross-Country cup.
