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OUR CONTEMPORARIES SAY—

The final net enrolment in the Boston University summer session is 369 as compared with 252 last year, a gain of 46 per cent. The members of the school made an excursion to Plymouth today. Next Tuesday at 1 P. M. Professor John P. Marshall, head of the department of music, and Ralph E. Brown, who served during the war as an army song leader, will give a demonstration of the work done during the war in organizing community singing among enlisted men. At 4 P. M. Professor E. Charlton Black will give an address on "Stevenson and Barrie" and on Thursday Professor Marshall and R. C. Robinson will give an organ recital at the First Church.

Extensive alterations have begun in the buildings of four departments of the University. In the College of Liberal Arts, the first and second floors are being remodelled, the general design being to remove to the second story the various study and recreation rooms formerly occupied on the first floor by the women students.

The building at 70 St. Botolph street, to be occupied by the recently established College of Secretarial Science, will be ready for occupation at the opening day, Monday, Sept. 22. The first floor will be occupied by the administrative offices, the second by recitation rooms, and the third by an assembly hall and recitation rooms. The work has progressed so far that next Tuesday Director T. Lawrence Devis will occupy his office in the building. In the College of Business Administration the library and museum, hitherto on the first floor, will be removed to the top floor.

The School of Religious Education, which henceforth is to be entirely distinct from the School of Education will occupy several floors of the buildings extending from the corner of Dartmouth and Boylston streets, to the building of the Massachusetts Woman Suffrage Association. Alterations have already begun on the buildings, and they will be ready for occupancy on the opening day in September.

To obtain a new air for the Yale song "Bright College Years" which is now sung to "The Watch on the Rhine," the class of 1899, through Murray Dodge, its secretary, has offered \$1000 as a prize. The prudential committee of the corporation received the notice and selection of a tune is to rest with the alumni advisory board.

Announcement is made that the Prudential committee of Yale University has elected Professor Albert Feuillerat, of the University of Rennes, France, visiting professor at Yale for the coming year.

It was also announced that a gift of \$25,000 has been received from Mrs. John C. Fennell of Kansas City, to establish a fund in memory of her son Charles B. Fennell, a Sheffield graduate in the class of 1911. Other gifts reported include a bird collection from Dr. George Hawley and Samuel Hawley of Bridgeport.

Total registration for the Brown University summer session amounts to 180 students of whom approximately one-fourth are from the Women's College. The number of students is growing daily as former students at Brown return from overseas. While the enrolment figures are small, the first summer school that the college has ever had is fully satisfactory, according to Registrar F. T. Guild.

Besides the usual summer overhauling of the dormitories and class-rooms, extensive alterations are being made to the Brown Union. The office has been enlarged, while a new coat of paint is being added to the whole of the interior.

Some of Harvard's best-known alumni returned to Cambridge last Monday as "students" in the three days' school established for the divisional chairmen in the campaign for a new \$10,000,000 endowment fund for the university. The list of acceptances includes:

For the first time in its history the College of Hawaii has conferred the degree of doctor of laws. Presentation was made at the eighth annual commencement exercises and the recipients were Sanford Ballard Dole, President of the Republic of Hawaii and first Governor of the Territory, and Prof. Marion M. Scott, who has been prominent in educational work in the islands of Japan.

Columbia University opened its summer session yesterday with a registration to date of more than 5000. As enrolment does not end until July 9, it is believed that the figure will be much larger. A course which bids fair to be popular is called "Americanization of the Immigrant." Various other courses coming under the general head of Americanization will be offered, and will aim to increase the civic knowledge of students. English for foreigners is another course which is expected to be popular.

Arrangements for a campaign to raise a \$14,000,000 endowment fund for Princeton University have been practically completed, according to an announcement by Dr. John Grier Hibben, president. The fund will be devoted mainly to increasing salaries and to caring for the growth of the institution.

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
