

COLLEGE NOTES

YORK UNIVERSITY Sergeant Alvin T. York, acclaimed as the greatest hero of the world war, has decided to devote his life to furthering the education of the young men and women of rural and mountain sections of Tennessee. For this purpose he proposes to establish the "York University."

In order to secure funds for this work Sergeant York will make a tour of the principal cities of the country, delivering a lecture on his life and his part in the war.

BOSTON UNIVERSITY—Arrangements were completed yesterday for the enrollment of 600 members of the Boston Chapter of the American Institute of Banking Administration of Boston University beginning next October. The students will study banking, business correspondence, credits, advanced English composition, Spanish and business law under the leadership of the faculty of the college during a 16 weeks' period.

This special arrangement and the logical growth of the evening division promise an evening student body of not less than 2500 for the coming year.

UNIVERSITY OF ILLINOIS—The coming Camps, Staggs, Yosts and Zupkes—the athletic coaches of the future—will not be developed haphazardly. Instead of being educated for other professions and taking up coaching incidentally, the new coaches will have the benefit of four years' special training for their work and the prestige of a university degree.

That is the plan of the University of Illinois where a department of athletic coaching and physical education has been established. A four-year course will open Sept. 22. Those who complete it will receive the degree of bachelor of science.

It is expected that many high school graduates interested in athletics will enroll. The Illinois idea is new. No other university has recognized the importance of such education by offering a four-year course and degree.

CARLISLE SCHOOL FOR INDIANS The campaign of the Indians of the eastern states to secure the re-opening of the Carlisle School for Indians by the War Department was started in Syracuse July 25. Chiefs of the various New York State tribes conferred with Indian Commissioner Hugh C. Scott, retired major general, U. S. A. in an effort to secure his support.

General Scott a few years ago was offered the command of the Carlisle post and school by the War Department.

The school was closed following the declaration of war, when the War Department converted the buildings into army hospitals. Desks, books and other equipment were shipped to Indian reservation schools, and as far as can be learned, there is no intention of reopening Carlisle as a school.

One hundred New York State Indians are ready to enter it if the campaign proves successful. Other eastern states are said to have as many candidates.

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Scientific Instruments

PRIZE OFFERED FOR BEST MILITARY HISTORY ESSAY

The American Historical Association, 1140 Woodward Building, Washington, D. C., offers a prize of \$250 for the best unpublished essay on American military history submitted to the Military History Prize Committee before July 1, 1920. The essay may treat of any event of American military history—a war, a campaign, a battle; the influence of diplomatic or political situation upon military operations; an arm of the service; the fortunes of a particular command; a method of warfare historically treated; the career of a distinguished soldier. It should not be highly technical in character for the object of the contest is to extend the interest in American military history but it must be a positive contribution of historical knowledge and the fruit of original research.

The essay is not expected to be less than 10,000 or more than 100,000 words in length. It should be submitted in typewritten form, unsigned, and should be accompanied by a sealed envelope marked with its title and containing the name and address of the author; and a short biographical sketch. Maps, diagrams or other illustrative materials accompanying a manuscript should bear the title of the essay.

The committee, in reaching a decision, will consider not only research, accuracy and originality, but also clearness of expression and literary form. It reserves the right to withhold the award if no essay is submitted attaining the required degree of excellence.
