"COOP" GIVES FINANCIAL REPORT

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There is a little put away for the depreciation of the stock, a certain amount is paid off on the mortgage, the employees are paid, and the rest is paid back to the students. The stock holders hold the stock and that is all. They accepted the stock under the conditions that they would return it when asked to do so and would receive no interest on it. The stock is given so as to make it a corporation under the laws of Massachusetts. Therefore it is not to the benefit of the men in charge of the store to ask more than the market price for goods for they do not get it themselves. Even if they did charge more which they say they do not, the money gained by such means would have to be returned to the men who had paid it in the form of dividends, for there would be nothing else to do with it.

The stock holders from Technology are Professor Dewey and Mr. Humphreys from the faculty and Homer V. Howes from the student body. Colonel Cole was the other member from the faculty but he has resigned. Who is to take his place is not known as yet.

The sales of the Harvard store have not yet been compiled, so that no comparative figures are available as to the relative financial standing of the two stores, but as viewed from the fact that the members of that store are receiving only 9 per cent on cash purchases and

7 on charge sales, the total must be smaller there than at the Technology store. Only 2147 men joined the co-operation at Harvard last year which is far below the average for the last ten years.

The Harvard Co-operative store was started at Harvard square in 1882 and has been run on efficient basis from that time on as proved by the fact that it has lasted. Most co-operative stores fail inside of five years at the most. This one, on the contrary, has not only not failed but it has expanded. Three years ago, the Technology branch was established. Since that time this branch has been able to meet expenses and pay dividends. The first year 8 per cent was paid, the second 10 per cent and now it is 10 per cent again. Another branch store has just been established at Harvard square.

Makes Good at Lehigh

In July, 1917, Morris became assistant director at the arm and navy aviation school at the Institute and served in this position with pleasing results until the school was closed. His work was noted way down in South Bethlehem and last March he was called to Lehigh as track coach.

Although the university had been without a track guide for three years, he produced a team that made the middle Atlantic state colleges look to their laurels.

In a dual meet with Swarthmore, 32 points were scored by Lehigh, a larger number than its fondest admirers had dared hoped for. Lafayette also took Kanaly's charges into camp, the South Bethlehem boys showing great improvement, however. It was in the final meet of the year that the young coach's methods proved their worth, for Muhlenburg was defeated in the best meet ever staged in the Pennsylvania city. He developed a relay team, too, that forced Lafayette to a new middle Atlantic record at the Meadowbrook games.

I was not surprising, therefore, when "Bossy" Reiter, the former Princeton football star, and now physical director at Lehigh, informed Morris he was chosen year-round track coach at Lehigh.

Following Frank's methods, Morris will start cross-country running for the track candidates early in the fall, and as the collegians are enthusiastic, he believes Lehigh soon will climb toward the top in track athletics.

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Ryder's pupils, equalled the old marks in the sprints covering the 100-yd. dash in 10 seconds and furlong in 21 4-5 seconds. The sprint was run in two heats, Hayes got away to a beautiful start and never was headed, although he had only about a yard on E. O. Gourdin at the tape.

The long sprint was won by nearly five yards over Arthur Reed of the West End House by the Notre Dame crack.

Earl Thompson established a new mark in the hurdle race closely followed by his teammates, H. H. Hile and A. S. Roberts. James Connolly, the B. A. A. flier run away with the mile, being more than a quarter of a lap ahead of E. F. Hannon, another wearer of the Unicorn.

Irving Howe started off in the quarter as if he was going to make a joke of the other contestants, but Jake Driscoll, 1918, champion and another Unicorn flier caught him as they were turning into the home stretch and went into the lead, never to be headed. Howe was almost caught at the finish by Garvin Bawden of the Institute who was going exceedingly well considering that he was suffering from a stiff ankle. The time on the half was slow but was, nevertheless, one of the best races of the day. J. A. Caffrey and C. J. Cleary, both B. A. A. men were neck and neck almost the whole distance with Caffrey winning by about a yard and a half.

About twenty were facing the starter in the three mile but the bunch soon

began to dwindle, Harold Weeks taking up the pacing job. Weeks continued in the lead and won by half a lap in 13 minutes 29 seconds.

The shotput was an easy triumph for John C. Lawler, to B. A. A. giant, who heaved the iron ball 42 ft. 5 in.

Another of Jack Ryder's stable Harry Barwise, bettered Walter Whalen who jumped 6 ft. 1 in. The battle was a fine one to watch but Barwise was better conditioned, and won by beating his old mark, going over 6 ft. 2 in.

The B. A. A. came away out in the tally, scoring 72 1-2 points out of 108 1-2 points awarded. The West End House came next with a score of 18 points. Hurja Club, Quincy came away 5. The Dorchester Club 4, Karhu Club Quincy 3, St. Alphonsus 2, Technology 1, Posse Gym 1 and Providence Y. M. C. A. 1.

Eight B. A. A. men have been chosen to represent N. A. at the national games to be held in Philadelphia, Sept. 12 and 13.

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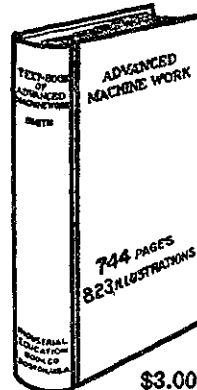
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
